TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, July 14th.—In accordance with an act of Parliament already passed the Lord Chancellor announces that after July 15th women are liable to serve on juries under the same conditions as men. It states that husband and wife will not be permitted to serve on the same occasion.

London July 14th.—Colonel Amery, Under Secretary of State for the Colonies, speaking at a luncheon given by Lord Burnham to the Council of the Empire Press Union, said the forthcoming press conference at Ottawa would devote itself to big problems of reconstruction and development. These would be largely worked out in the great dominions and accordingly, it was fortunate that the conference would be held in Ottawa.

London, July 14th.—What is tantamount to a threat of direct action for the purpose of forcing the Govt. to call a truce and withdraw the troops from Ireland and institute an Irish Parliament, was voted at the Trades Union Congress yesterday, when a resolution introduced by the Miners Federation was adopted on a card vote of 2,760,000. This vote followed previous rather confusing votes but its effect, according

to James Henry Thomas, General Secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, is that, should the Government ignore the railwaymen's resolution calling for a truce in Ireland and the opening of an Irish Parliament, it would become the duty of the Congress Committee to see that the miners' resolution is carried into effect. It is believed however, that before any ballot on this subject is taken, another Congress will be summoned to consider the matter.

Bisley Camp, July 15th.—The South African Team won the Kolapore Challenge Cup, the historic trophy presented by the Rajah of Kolapore for competition by members of His Majesty's forces in 1871. It is the first time that South Africa has won the Kolapore Cup.

Paris, July 15th.—France yesterday celebrated the one hundred and thirty-first anniversary of the taking of the Bastille. Artillery and infantry estimated to number 41,000 marched through Paris to Vincennes Race Track, where they participated in a great review. Posts of vantage were occupied by thousands of Parisians who took up their positions shortly after dawn. All the buildings of Paris were flag-bedecked, the French and British flags being entwined with the colours of the other Allies.
