TELEGRAMS.

ST CROIX STATION.

London, Oct. 5th.—It is said that the British Govt. has decided to transfer to the British Red Cross, for famine relief distribution in Russia, certain surplus war stores consisting in part of medicines and clothing. These stores are valued at approximately £250,000.

Honolulu, Oct. 5th.—The Nippunji, a Japanese language paper published here, has received a cable dispatch from Tokio, announcing that the Imperial household has issued a special bulletin, saying that the condition of Emperor Yoshihito is still unfavourable. The despatch declares that his locomotive faculties and his speech are practically paralyzed and also that his power of memory has decreased.

Paris, Oct. 6th.—Nineteen persons are known to have lost their lives in the collision of two suburban trains in the tunnel leading to the St. Lazare railway station here yesterday. 3 more bodies have been recovered today.

London, Oct. 6th.—London is to have a new morning paper. The Westminster Gazette, whose politics are moderate Liberal, as represented by the Asquith element of the party, is to be transferred to that field. Sir William Robertson Nicoll, editor of the weekly, announcing the transformation, says that the Gazette's size and appearance will be somewhat like the Times and the price will be two pennies. Mr. A. Spencer will be political director. It is also announced that the experiment has behind it very influential support.

Bombay, Oct. 6th.—48 non-cooperation leaders, including Mahatma Gandhi, the Nationalist leader, have issued a mani-

festo reaffirming that it is contrary to the National dignity for an Indian to serve the British Government, especially as a soldier and urging every Indian soldier and civilian to sever connections with the Government "which has brought about India's economic moral and political degradation" Gandhi, writes to the Bombay Chronicle that it is persistently rumoured his arrest is imminent. He appeals to the people in such an event to remain peaceful and refrain from strikes and merely to show their regard for him by greater zeal to the cause of home rule, thereby hastening the advent of full independence.

London, Oct. 6th.—Mr. Lloyd George stated definitely that it would be impossible for him to attend the Washington conference, in a telegram he sent to the Ambassador at Washington which is quoted by the Melbourne (Australia) correspondent of the London "Times" as having been read by Mr. Hughes in the House of Representatives. The Prime Minister's view, as further set forth in the telegram was that the British delegation should consist of Mr. Balfour and two others. The correspondent adds that Mr. Hughes said one of the others was the First Lord of the Admiralty, but the third man had not been named, because he had not yet consented to go. According to the Prime Minister's telegram, to the Ambassador, says the correspondent, it was arranged at the recent Imperial Conference that his Majesty's Government should represent the whole Empire at the Washington conferences, but the Government now would prefer to include the Dominion point of view. Mr. Lloyd George added, "it will be impossible for me to attend, as the conference is sure to be prolonged, and so many matters demand my attention in England."

Paris, Oct. 6th.—Twenty-six dead have been recovered from the St. Lazare tunnel disaster and the wreckage has been virtually cleared away. There are fragments of bodies which the rescuers and doctors have been unable to assemble, therefore it is impossible to say at the present time what the complete death-list numbers. Thirteen of the bodies have been identified.

London, Oct. 6th.—The Cabinet, after a two-hours meeting this afternoon was adjourned until tomorrow morning. It was learned that the composition of the British delegation to the forthcoming conference with the Irish leaders was discussed, and although the names were not finally approved, it was understood that the Government would be represented by the following delegates: Mr. Lloyd George, Lord Birkenhead, Sir Hamar Greenwood, Mr. Austen Chamberlain, Sir Laming Worthingham-Evans and Mr. Winston Churchill.

Dublin, Oct. 6th.—The principle of Irish unity was reiterated this afternoon by Eamoh De Valera, the Irish Republican leader, in addressing a North Antrim

deputation, the last of several delegations from Nationalists within the area of the Northern Parliament. Ireland is naturally a unit, Mr. De Valera declared any attempt to depart from the whole nation as a unit, would lead necessarily to political absurdities. He asserted that the dividing of Ireland did not get rid of the minority problems, but multiplied them. He said the unity of Ireland was as much a fundamental principle as self-determination, adding that both were based upon right and justice.

Madrid, Oct. 6th.—At a late hour the Minister of War issued a communique on the situation around Melille, which says: "After enveloping the Moors through the capture of Atlatan, the remainder of the objectives were occupied."

Melbourne, Oct. 5th.—The delegation to the Washington conference will consist of six delegates, including three dominion representatives, Mr. Hughes announced in the House of Representatives here today. The Premier said he had received the information in a cablegram from London. The Australian Govt. has appointed Geo. Foster Pearce, Minister of Defence as its representative.

Paris, Oct. 6th.—The Japanese embassy in Paris this evening issued an official communication to the French newspapers concerning the condition of Emperor Yoshihito saying, "the latest bulletin, regarding the health of his majesty the Emperor, registers changes that have occurred since the last bulletin, issued in April. This bulletin, while noting no improvement in his condition, adds that the general state of the Emperor's health is not greatly aggravated." The Paris newspapers during the past few days have published despatches, dated, Tokio saying that the Emperor was dying and that Prince Hirohito had been appointed regent.

Paris, Oct. 7th.—France is insured reparations payments and Germany is given a means to avoid possible bankruptcy, through the agreement signed yesterday at Wiesbaden by Mr. Louis Locheur, French Minister of liberated regions, and Dr. Walter Rathenau, German Minister of reconstruction. The agreement is regarded here as of extreme importance and will permit Germany to pay the equivalent of seven billion gold marks in the next five years. First reports indicated the agreement would run but three years but it is found, upon examination of the pact, that it does not expire before May 1st, 1928.
