TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

Chicago, June 9th.—The Credentials Committee completed the permanent roll of the Republican National Convention this morning and the previous rulings on contracts by the National Committee were sustained in all but three cases. Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, whom President Wilson appointed as Chairman urged the party to rise up and sweep the dynasty out of power.

Berlin, June 9th.—According to the figures supplied by the semi-official Hoffman Agency at Munich, for the whole of Bavaria, the Bavarian people's party have secured twelve seats in the Reichstag, the Social Democrats five, the Independent Socialists four, the Peasants Party two, the Democrats two and the so-called Mittel Party two. The Communists polled only forty-six thousand votes and hence secured no seats.

London, June 9th.—General McDougall of Ottawa and a party of Canadians entertained M. Krassin, the Russian Soviet Minister of Trade and Commerce, at a luncheon at the Carlton today. It is understood that Russo-Canadian relations were discussed during the luncheon. This was M. Krassin's first business engagement.

City Island, June 9th.—For the first time since the arrival of the challenger for the America's Cup, the "Shamrock Fourth," the yacht was given a sail stretching trial under full racing canvas today. With the exception of the Spinaker, all the sails used on the racing yacht were broken out in the lightest north winds owing to the weather con-

San Francisco, June 9th.—A declaration in favour of the ratification of the treaty of Versailles will be the main plank in the Democratic Platform, according to a statement made by Chairman Cummings today.

Washington, June 9th.—The Navy Department today announced that the ex-German battleship "Ostfriesland," the

cruiser "Frankfort" and the destroyers apportioned to the United States are expected to sail for America about the middle of July. The destroyers probably will be towed across directly to the Washington Navy Yard, but it is undecided as yet where the two large ships will go first. They will be inspected by naval experts on arrival, after which the public will be allowed to visit them. It is expected they will be taken for a tour later on and will be maintained in United States ports for public exhibition.
