TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

San Juan, P. R., April 6th.—The Secretary of the Navy, Mr. Denby arrived here this morning on the U. S. Transport Henderson, in order to be present at the inauguration of Mr. Towner, as Governor, at 10.30 a. m. today. Mr. Denby was met by a Representative Business Committee and a Government Committee. Governor Towner arrived yesterday and met by a delegation of leading officials and private citizens. A large crowd filled the streets.

St. Johns, Nfld., April 5th.—Determined efforts are being made by the Newfoundland Government to send food supplies to starving settlements along the South coast, isolated for many weeks by the ice fields that block their harbours. The mail steamer Kyle, plying between this port and Sydney, today was taken off that route and will leave tomorrow for the southern settlements laden with provisions.

Paris, April 5th.—The French press, of all shades of political opinion, denounce the execution of the Vicar-General, which it terms an assassination and an outrage to modern civilization. Attention is called by some of the editorial writers to the similarity of the circumstances in this case and the assassination of the late Czar Nicholas, which they point out also took place in a cellar. "Le Journal" declares that if it is true, as the Russian newspapers are quoted as saying, that the red leaders demanded "a Catholic victim for the Catholic Easter", it is a confession of "the ritual character of the assassination". Gustave Herve, in "La Victoire", says the execution will serve as a rude lesson to the western World and all the intellectual, moral and social groups responsible for civilization.

New York, April 5th.—Members of

the League of Nations would be willing to withdraw article 10 of the covenant of the League if that were the only obstacle to United States cooperation, Lord Robert Cecil, British proponent of the League of Nations, declared last night in an address before the League of Nations, non-partisan association. "There are some people", he said who criticize the League on the ground that some of the provisions, article 10 in particular, crystallize the actual conditions which prevail in consequence of the Versailles and other Paris treaties". Lord Robert declared that in his opinion the League did not create any such arbitrary conditions. It was, he said, a more flexible arrangement capable of change and improvement. Article 10, he said, might be eliminated. Provision must be made, he added, for the submission for discussion to the assembly of the League of any treaty which proved undesirable, or likely to disturb the peace of the world.

London, April 5th.—The only London newspapers to ignore the news of the marriage of Lady Northcliffe were the Daily Mail, one of the late Lord Northcliffe's publications, now conducted by his brother, Lord Rothermere, and the latter's Daily Mirror. The Evening News, which was owned by Lord Northcliffe, gave an account of the wedding in its later editions. Some of the morning newspapers made the event their chief feature.

Dusseldorf, April 6th.—Articles of daily necessity ranging all the way from tea kettles to automobiles were confiscated in large quantities by the French at Bochum yesterday, according to reports from German quarters.

Berlin, April 6th.—Serious conflicts in the Ukraine between the Bolsheviks and peasants are reported in despatches received here by way of Lemberg. The Bolsheviks are declared to have executed 340 peasants, apparently because of protests against the Soviet persecution of high church dignitaries.

Moscow, April 6th.—It is announced that Justice Calkin, who presided over the Soviet court which recently tried Archbishop Zepliak, Vicar-General Butchkavitch and the other Catholic priests and Nikolai Krylenko who was the prosecuting attorney, will officiate in the trial of the Most Rev. Dr. Tikhon, former Patriarch of all Russia, which has been set for April 11th. With Dr. Tikhon will be tried Archbishop Tikander of Moscow, Archbishop Arseny of Novgorod and M. Gourieff, secretary of the Holy Synod, who will be accused under several articles of the criminal code, including the counter revolutionary article which permits of the death penalty if the court so will.

Sebastopol, April 6th.—After a lapse of 18 years Lieutenant Stevenaki, who took part in the execution of Lieut. Schmidt, Commander of the Russian cruiser Tchakoff and who in 1905 headed
