BANKING ABROAD

In a pamphlet, entitled A Message from Mexico, issued by the American Exchange National Bank, New York we read the following about Banking conditions in Mexico, viz:

"The banking situation is in fact very serious. The chick pea growers, whose crop this year is plentiful, the farmers who this year are harvesting more wheat than in any previous year, the cotton planters, whose production will exceed a million bales, and the hemp planters all are actually being crushed by the money lenders, middlemen and profiteers. They are selling their products at half price, while the middlemen and profiteers sell at double prices. The business men in general in Mexico consider themselves fortunate if they succeed in obtaining loans at 5 or 6 per cent per month. Under such conditions, business is terribly handicapped, and this clearly explains the great contraction of business at present in Mexico, and shows the pressing need of rehabilitating the banks in order to renew and stimulate trade."

Six per cent interest, per month!
