Zealand hunter. He attended a remarkable display by 12,000 children on the Sydney cricket ground in the afternoon. The solid masses of children grouped themselves into a gigantic Prince of Wales' feathers with the legend "many happy returns." The Prince visited Sydney University afterwards receiving the honorary degree of doctor of laws. He was the guest of the Queen's club at a magnificent ball in the town hall in the evening.

London, June 23rd.—In the House of Lords yesterday a third reading was given to the matrimonial causes bill, a measure which has caused much controversy. The bill was carried, the motion for rejection being easily defeated. The official secrets bill was read a second time.

Mexico City, June 23rd.—Yellow fever is believed to have broken out in Vera Cruz, where numerous cases of bubonic plague were reported recently.

Ottawa, June 24th.—Questioned in the House yesterday afternoon, Sir George Foster said it was not intended to give details at present regarding the agreement reached between Canada and the West Indies, in order to enable representatives from the West Indies to present the agreement to their respective Governments, that an understanding had been reached not to give out details until August 4th. He hoped, however, to make a statement to the House later.

London June 23rd.—Five Sinn Feiners were killed by machine gun-fire, employed to cover the removal of several protestants from barrack street tonight, according to a military statement.

London, June 23rd.—The fighting in Londonderry was still on at eight o'clock tonight. Machine-guns were in action. The city was evidently in for another night of terror. Three more deaths were reported. A despatch says that hundreds of refugees from Derry are arriving in the counties of Tyrone and Donegal. Unionists hold the road from Carrigans to Derry and are strongly intrenched in Prehenwood. There is a movement in

other northern towns, says the despatch, to join in if the Derry riots continue. The Attorney General for Ireland, Mr. Denis Heary, announced in the House of Commons today that 500 troops arrived in Londonderry yesterday, and that there were now 1,400 soldiers and 150 police in the city which has 40,000 inhabitants. The Government, said the Attorney General, was prepared to send whatever reinforcements were required.

Paris, June 24th.—According to the Petit Journal, three ambassadors to Germany have been selected. Charles Laurent, representing France, Lord Abernon, representing Great Britain, and Signor De Martine, representing Italy.

Dublin, June 24th.—Cardinal Logue, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate at Maynooth college, said yesterday that he had received warning that "his time was set." The Cardinal declared that he was grateful for this warning because "it gave him time to prepare," adding, "I have always tried to do what I could for my countrymen, and have never consciously said a word to offend anybody, no matter what his religion or politics. If I come to a sudden end there will be no justification for those responsible." No indication of the source of the warning was given by the aged Cardinal.

Smyrna, Asia Minor, June 24th.—The Greek army has begun an offensive against the forces of Mustapha Kemal Pasha, the Turkish nationalist leader, according to an official statement issued by Greek head quarters today.

Wimbledon, June 24th.—J. C. Parker, the British tennis star, was defeated this morning by William T. Tilden, of Philadelphia, in straight sets in their match here today in the British lawn tennis championship tournament, the score being 6-3, 6-2, 6-4.

NewPort, R. I. June 25th The Vanite defeated the Rosolute today in their eleventh race, leading at the finish by forty-two seconds corrected time and one minute and seconds elapsed. The race was a hard one and we

London, June 25th.—A possible new policy of dealing with the Irish situation was foreshadowed today when the Attorney General told the House of Commons that the Government had received an offer of 3,000 officers and added that the offer was being carefully considered. The English Liberal newspapers have had rumours that such a step was under consideration and have expressed the view that it would greatly inflame Irish animosity. The soldiers employed in Ireland thus far have been in regiments from the British side of the channel and it was commented that the use of soldiers from one Irish faction might result in a step towards civil war.

Belfast, June 25th.—Six motor-lorries filled with fully armed troops left Belfast last night for Londonderry. Two lorries filled with equipment for the troops and an armoured car also were despatched to Londonderry.

Sandy Hook, N. J., June 24.—Shamrock IV had an informal span off here today. The yacht beat down the main ship channel to Scotland light vessel and then back to her anchorage inside the hook. She carried a new topmast which is shorter than her old spar. The rig improved the sailing qualities of the craft and her performance was highly satisfactory to Mr. Nicholson and captain Burton. The shorter mast reduced the Shamrock's rating by almost a minute over a thirty mile course. Sir Thomas stated that the challenger would race the 23 meter trial yacht tomorrow.
