Resolution.

Be it enacted by the Colonial Council for St. Croix in Session assembled:

The Governor is hereby authorized to borrow the sum of Frcs. 25,000 from the Reserve Fund, to be deposited in the Colonial Treasury and to be applied in accordance with the terms of Colonial Council Bill No. 12, 2nd Session 1919-1920.

That the loan thus authorized is to be secured by a mortgage bond to bear no interest.

That the building acquired in accordance with the terms of Colonial Council Bill No. 12, 2nd Session 1919-1920 is to be rented for the sum of Frcs. 125 per month, such rentals to be deposited in a redemption Fund to be known as the "Frederiksted High School Redemption Fund", there to remain so deposited until such deposits equal the amount of the mortgage bond, when the total amount shall be deposited in the Colonial Treasury and applied in satisfying the mortgage held in the Reserve Fund.

Thus duly passed at the 3rd Ordinary Meeting of the Colonial Council held Monday, October 20, 1919.

As a matter of fact, very few groceries can supply the article, and those where it can be obtained are probably determined to fleece the public while the little they have lasts. It is against an old policy of this paper to attack any one or accuse places of business of profiteering, but under the present circumstances, there is no name for such a price for meal than profiteering. The increase over the last market price is in excess of 25%, and when it is remembered that

the cornmeal has been on hand quite a while, the question as to why this rise, is very pertinent. The Food Commission has ground to work upon right away here.
