TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Ottawa, Dec. 5th.—The first International Conference between Canada and the United States closed this afternoon with expressions of mutual goodwill. Canadian postal officials will now prepare a new convention between the two countries to supersede the convention of 1858 and forward it to Washington for approval. The convention will embody the decisions of the Conference, and according to present understanding, will come into effect January 1st. This afternoon's sitting was devoted to the clearing up of business left over from the morning and the exchange of views on departmental work. It was agreed that each country should grant to the other free transit across the territory by all trains that it uses for its own mails of the closed mail made up by any authorized exchange office of either country addressed to any exchange office of the same country. The United States also agreed to carry Canadian parcel post in transit across the United States territory to South American countries by the route she now uses for the transmission of her own parcels on payment of twenty cents a pound by Canada. At the present time Canadian parcels to some of the South American countries have to be routed via England.

Lausanne, Dec. 6th.—The Entente plan for keeping open the Straits of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus in time of peace and war provides for the appointment of an International Commission of Control composed of the Great Powers, including the United States, as well as Turkey and the countries bordering on the Black Sea. Lord Curzon, in the name of the Allies, presented the details of this comprehensive project to the Near East Conference today.
