ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Nov 3rd.—Tennessee has swung into the swelling republican columns shattering democratic tradition of a solid south. Her shift from the democratic ranks coupled with a similar upset in Oklahoma assured Harding 390 electoral votes as against 127 definitely in the Cox column and left in doubt but fourteen seats in the electoral college divided among four states. In all of these states, save New Mexico, Harding was in the lead on available returns and even in New Mexico republican managers were claiming a Harding plurality though available returns showed a Cox lead. Tennessee on the face of returns from 93 to 95 counties with fifty precincts missing gave Harding 199,759 votes and Cox 189,782, a Harding plurality of 9,977. Governor Roberts, Democrat, was swept out on the Republican tide and Alfred A. Taylor unsuccessful candidate for Governor against his brother in 1896, was elected. Returns today showed the following states had given their electoral votes a total of 390 for Harding. Berlin, Nov. 4th.—Of the United States election the Lokol Anzeiger says: "We have got rid of Wilson who in the last analysis was to blame for our misfortunes. Mr. Harding will play politics and mix in world affairs only so far as they concern the United States interest". The Zeitung Amittag says: "It would be premature to regard the end of Wilson too optimistically".

Paris, Nov. 4th.—Paris papers agree that Sena or Harding's success is a distinct defeat for the League of Nations as established by the Wilson covenant.

London, Nov. 4th.—The morning Post compares President Wilson with Lenine. It says both are idealists with identical methods, though different aims, and thinks that rejection by the United States of such autocratic idealism will bring relief to the world. The "Daily Chronicle" admits the battle raged around the body of the League of Nations, but not in the sense that the United States is hostile to concerted measures to preserve peace.

Paris, Nov. 2nd.—The French Foreign Office informed the Associated Press today that France would not interfere in the Greek situation unless ex-King Constantine attempts to return to Greece.

Geneva, Nov. 2nd.—Ex King Constantine and ex-Queen Sophie are still keeping to their rooms in the hotel National at Lucerne although Prince Paul is seen

in the streets. Ex-King Constantine is greatly depressed by the report that Great Britain and France, which guaranteed the Kingdom of Greece, would refuse even if the elections were favourable to him to allow his return to the Greek throne.

Paris, Nov. 2nd.—The South Russian Embassy here asserted today that the retreat now being carried out by Genl. Wrangel is in conformity with a preconcerted strategical plan by which he proposed to realign his forces in the Don and Crimea regions. These regions, the Embassy said, would serve as the base of new operations which circumstances might make necessary.

London, November 2nd.—Mr. Austen Chamberlain, an evening newspaper asserts tonight, has been offered the position of Viceroy of India.

London, Nov. 2nd.—According to cables from Wellington, N. Zealand is to issue a loan which will provide for compulsory subscriptions equal to a year's average income tax.

Dublin, Nov. 2nd.—There were at least 14 separate attacks on the police and military in the west and south of Ireland on Sunday evening. In these attacks six police were killed and 8 wounded. One military, one naval man wounded and a civilian was killed.

San Salvador, Rep of Salvador, Nov. 4th.—The Volcano of Izalco, ten miles north of the city of Sonsonate, has broken forth in a new eruption. Great quantities of lava are being discharged on the northernly slope of the mountain.
