TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

London, Jan. 23rd.—Mr. Cramp, President of the National Union of Railwaymen announced that Mr. J. H. Thomas had resigned as political secretary of the union. Mr. Cramp said the resignation was due solely to the fact that Mr. Thomas had been appointed Colonial Secretary in the MacDonald Cabinet, and was not connected with the present railway dispute.

London, Jan. 23rd.—The appointments of the remaining members of the new Government were made public in an official list today. Those appointments none of which presumably is included in the cabinet, are Minister of Pensions, Commoner Frederick Owen Roberts, Attorney General, Patrick Hastings, Solicitor General, Henry Slessor, Financial Secretary to the Treasury, Commoner William Graham, Financial Secretary to the War Office, Commoner John James Lawson, Parliamentary Secretary to the Treasury, Commoner Benjamin Charles Spoor, Under Secretaries for War, Commoner Clement Richard Attlee, and Sydney Arnold, Foreign Affairs, Commoner Arthur Ponsonby, Home Affairs, Commoner Rhys John Davies, India Commoner Prof. Robert Richards, Health for Scotland Commoner James Stewart. The following are Parliamentary Secretaries, all members of the House of Commons. Admiralty, Charles Ammon Agriculture Walter Smith Board of Trade Albert, Victor Alexander. Education, Morgan Jones. Ministry Health, Arthur Greenwood. Labour Miss Mar-

garet Bondfield. Mines Department, Emmanuel Stinewell, Overseas Trade, William Lunn.

Washington, Jan. 23rd.—State Department evidence regarding Communist activities in Russia and the United States was concluded to before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee with charges of widespread work and propaganda in the United States. Mr. Wylie Egan, assistant chief of the Eastern Europe division of the State Department, presented scores of documents to establish the department's case. Propaganda in foreign language newspapers and other publications in the United States were outlined, with large newspaper files submitted in bulk as evidence, but not read to the committee. In the work among labour unions men, Mr Wylie Egan said that according to information "regarded as reliable by the State Department" William Z. Foster in 1921 brought \$40,000 from Moscow. Later, he said, Foster received a fund of \$90,000 and an additional \$35,000 from a Moscow agent. Work by Communists among United States mine workers, especially in West Virginia and Illinois coal fields, also was charged and farmers, he said, were subject to Communists propaganda. Motion pictures, he added, had been used extensively in the work.

Y., all its property, including among other things all trademarks and registrations thereof, instrument dated August 23, 1923 and recorded in the United States Patent Office on October 29, 1923; and that the said assignments *in respect to the above mentioned trademark No. 33,389*, have this date been recorded in the Office of the Government Secretary of the Virgin Islands of the United States, at St. Thomas, in accordance with the provisions in the regulations governing the registration of patents and trademarks in the Virgin Islands, approved June 30, 1923.
