ST. CROIX STATION.

London, June 28th.—Two thousand British, Australian, German and Finnish prisoners of war were drowned when a Bolsheviki steamer was sunk recently in the Neva river according to a Helsingfors despatch to the "Central News." A Reuter's report from Stockholm would seem to confirm this despatch, saying that a ship was sunk on the 6th of June with two thousand repatriated prisoners on board, it does not, however, mention any loss of life.

San Francisco, June 28th.—Issues rather than men furnished the battleground for the democratic national convention opening here today. Candidates cannot be considered until prohibition, the league of nations and the Irish question have been fought out on the floor. Contests over these planks in the party platform seem inevitable, and the convention is all set for a stormy time. The big fight is over William Jennings Bryan's determination to have a platform "no wet can run on". Cox and Palmer are expected to go in for a test of strength on the first ballots. Strong forces working for MacAdoo will wait in the background for the psychological moment. Vice President Marshall will be brought forward as a "dark horse".

London, June 5th.—United States competitors at Henley regatta which will begin on the Thames Wednesday have been drawn as follows: Grand Challenge Cup, Boston, vs. Jesus College, Cambridge. Stewards Cup union boat club, Boston, vs. Magdalen College, Oxford. Diamond Sculls, William Chandler, vs. M. Missey, Kings College, Cambridge.

Warsaw, June 28th.—Fierce fighting is proceeding along the entire Polish front and increasing in intensity, according to the Polish official communication issued yesterday. The communication asserts that the Bolsheviki profiting by numerical superiority and great masses of cavalry are seeking decisive results at all costs. The heavy fighting for several days in the region of Lake Messuszo ended with the defeat of the Bolsheviki who were dislodged from their positions.

London, June 29th.—The King on Saturday entertained at a garden party three hundred and fifty men who have won the Victoria Cross in campaigns. The men marched to Buckingham Palace from Wellington Barracks, and were joined a few minutes later by relatives and friends. The men were arranged in groups according to seniority without regard to rank, and each was then presented to the King. The lists of guests included many names that will live long in British history, from Captain Carpen-

ter of the "Vindictive", which attacked Zeebrugge and Ostend, down to two drivers who saved the guns at Le Cateau. Private Lynn, who won the V. C. the D. C. M. and the Gun Cross of St. George and was then killed, was represented by his fiancée.

New York, June 28th.—Mr. William G. McAdoo would neither affirm nor deny today that he would accept the Presidential nomination, if tendered him by the Democratic Convention. Early in the day it was said at his office that he might comment on the statement by Mr. Thomas B. Love, National Committeeman from Texas, that Mr. MacAdoo would not refuse the nomination. He left his office the day however, without having made any statement.
