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TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Ancora, July 26th.—The Turkish Nationalist Congress here adopted a resolution today denouncing the peace terms accepted by the Constantinople Govt, and declaring that the Nationalists will denounce the terms militarily to the bitter end. Observers arriving here from the Caucasus say the Bolshevik are training an army of 10,000 at Baku on the Caspian Sea for an invasion of Persia. The force includes many Persian workmen, who are being trained primarily as propagandists, although having military instructors. The Bolshevik have insisted, according to the observers, that they will penetrate India after Persia, and rouse the entire Mohammedan world against the Turkish peace.

Paris July 26th.—The health of Mr. Lloyd George is causing serious anxiety, according to a London despatch. The Premier's physicians are said to have ordered an immediate absolute rest for him.

London July 26th.—The Govt. has no intention of withdrawing the Govt. of Ireland bill, Mr. Lloyd George stated in the House of Commons today. He confirmed reports that the Russian Soviet Govt. had sent the Govt. a note, accepting Great Britain's proposal for a peace conference in London. He will meet Mr. Millerand at Boulogne tomorrow to discuss the Russian proposal.

Athens, July 26th.—Colonel Jafartayar's bands are in full retreat from all directions and are falling back toward Kirk Kilisseh pressed by the Greeks who on Saturday took Lule Burgars southeast of Adrianople.

Guayaquil, July 26th.—Many buildings were damaged in a severe earthquake

here at 1.25 o'clock on Sunday afternoon. Two shocks were felt. No casualties have been reported.

London July 26th.—R. Norris Williams (Boston), defeated J.C. Parke of the British Davis Cup Team in the finals of the Norwood Lawn Tennis Tournament on Saturday 6-3, 6-4, 7-5.

Sandy Hook, July 26th.—Mr. Nicholson, designer of the Shamrock IV, still insists that the present races have been little more than trial races for the Shamrock. He thinks that in all future cup races the contenders should be manned entirely by a crew from the public they represent. The Resolute's crew is said to be made up largely by Scandinavian sailors. Should Sir Thomas fail to win the race today and lose the cup, he suggests that the Irish Baronet enter the challenger in a series of races with the Resolute and Vanitie alone for cups offered by local yacht clubs. It has also been suggested that all three yachts be sailed by professional skippers. Sir Thomas is said to have spent approximately \$1,000,000 in his latest attempt to lift the cup and yachting experts assert the Shamrock in the interest of yacht designing, should have further tests in competition with the Resolute and other sloops of the United States design. As a member of the New York Yacht Club, Sir Thomas can enter the Shamrock in the club races.

London, July 26th.—The Greeks have effected a landing at Media on the Black Sea Coast of Eastern Thrace, and have occupied Viza about 20 miles inland from that port, says the Exchange Telegraph Coy's. Athen's correspondent, quoting newspaper despatches received there.

Santiago, Chile, July 26th.—This city was rocked by a strong earthquake at 12.30 o'clock this morning. The disturbance was felt throughout the Central Zone of the country from Serena to Concepcion. Advices from Argentina say an earthquake occurred at Mendoza last night, lasting nearly two minutes. Estimates of the duration of the shock vary. Despatches from Valparaiso say that the earthquake produced considerable alarm.

Los Angeles, Cal., July 26th.—A sharp earthquake awoke Los Angeles this morning early. A few chimneys were knocked down, dishes broken and windows rattled.

Manila, July 26th.—Thousands were rendered homeless by a typhoon which, accompanied by torrential rains, swept the island of Luzon during the past ten days, causing tremendous damage. A

dyke of the Tulac River in Central Luzon was broken, flooding thousands of acres of rice and sugar lands, carrying off hundreds of small houses. The loss of life was reported small.

London, July 26th.—Reports that the Govt. was opening negotiations with representatives of the Sinn Fein for the purpose of reaching a compromise as to the future of Ireland were set at rest in the House by the Premier. He was asked by Lord Robert Cecil as to whether the Govt. was opening negotiations or pour parlers with any section of Ireland and answered the negative. Sir Hamar Greenwood declared in the House of Commons tonight that the troops and police had shown the utmost impartiality in Ireland and that the presence of the troops and warships had saved Belfast from a possible massacre and north Ireland from a civil war.

Sydney, N. S., July 27th.—The delegates of the Imperial Conference arrived here by the S. S. "Victorian" this morning. They will leave for Halifax by train this evening and arrive at nine o'clock tomorrow morning. The members of the party were given a royal welcome when they landed this morning.

London, July 26th.—Archbishop Daniel Mannix of Melbourne, Australia, will not be allowed to land in England because of his recent utterances. Mr. Lloyd George announced in the House of Commons today.

Athens, July 26th.—Adrianople fell to the Greeks on Saturday evening, according to an official statement last night. This virtually ends five day's operations against Jafartayar's principal forces. The campaign was carried out according to schedule by the armies in Thrace on the Maritza and at Rodosto joining forces at the proper moment and advancing rapidly and dispersing the enemy. The Turks fled in a panic throwing away their arms and abandoning supplies, guns, and ammunition. The Turkish Commander escaped from Adrianople in an automobile, proceeding to Kirk Kilisseh.

London, July 27th.—Sugar in stock on the 24th inst. was 158,000 tons. Last year 222,000 tons.
