TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

(Delayed in transmission.)

New York, June 5th.--Sir Thomas Lipton's twenty three metre yacht "Shamrock" to be used in trial races with the Challenger for the America's Cup, arrived here yesterday from England under her own sail.

New York, June 5th.--The Battleships "Warspite" and "Valiant" arrived here yesterday and transhipped a large number of marines into destroyers, which took them to Queenstown. A troopship embarked twelve troops at Devonport, and will carry them to Queenstown, from where they will be distributed in Wexford, Waterford, Cork and other countries. A goods train was wrecked last night at West Meath, in consequence of the rails having been torn up.

Constantinople, June 6th.--British warships fired on the Nationalists positions near Tonzla late on Friday, when Constantinople was aroused by heavy firing. The Nationalists approached close to the British entrenchments along the Gulf of Ismid, where many British units were stationed to protect the troops guarding the railway. The collapse of the Sultan's troops leaves the British forces alone to defend the railway terminal opposite Constantinople. Many Armenian and Greek refugees are reported to have entered Ismid, after having escaped from the Nationalists.

London June 6th.--An Exchange Telegraph Company's despatch from Rome states that fourteen persons were killed and several injured and many buildings destroyed in the suburban station at Turin last night, as the result of an explosion of seventy car loads of explosives.

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London, June 6th.--The first real test for the League of Nations, as a practical working body, will be made when the supreme council meets in London on June fourteenth to deal with the case of Persia, versus the Bolsheviks, and the result will probably be the exchange of correspondence between the League and Bolshevik leaders. If the latter decline to have any dealings on the subject, the position of the League, as a protector of small nations, will be placed on trial.

London, June 6th.--The "Times" reports that large consignments of sugar are being shipped from Great Britain to the United States. Some of these shipments recently arrived from the West Indies.

London, June 6th.--According to an official communication received here from the Moscow Govt. the Bolsheviks inflicted severe losses on the Polish forces in the attack south of Kiev on Friday. Bolshevik successes are also reported at other points along the firing front.
