Following instructions given me by the Virgin Islands Protective League through its Secretary Mr. Erick Roberts, under date Feb. 6th., I must refrain from any newspaper controversy directed against the League or its delegates, and leave those matters entirely in their own hands.

Whether Mr. Faucett or anyone else in America not connected with the League is any authority on what they write the records will show.

Personally, I don't know, and DON'T CARE.

I have no longer any desire to do anything for or against the people of the Labor Union, and trust that the League may be able to reach them through other channels if they care to.

So far as my job is concerned, of that I am especially proud.

I hardly know of anyone who left these islands for America that did not do menial work.

If rumor here has it right, there is and always will be a vast gulf of difference between Mr. Faucett and myself.

It would serve Mr. Faucett better to fight his grievances with the League and its delegates upon its merits, and leave personalities alone.
