New Port, R. I., June 9th.—The "Resolute" defeated the "Vanite" today in the official trial. The Resolute chased the Vanite over the entire 30 mile triangular course, but won through her time allowance, the margin being 59 seconds. The Resolute now has three wins to the Vanite's one.

London, June 10th.—The Bolsheviks have held up a forward movement begun in the Crimea early this week by General Wrangel's army. Genl. Wrangel succeeded to the command of the remnants of Genl. Denikine's forces in southern Russia.

Toronto, June 10th.—The list of the British overseas delegates to the Imperial Press Conference, which is to be held in Canada, this Summer is now complete and totals one hundred in all. Eighty of the delegates will come via England and land at Halifax on the 25th. inst.

Warsaw, June 10th.—It is announced that Poland will send a peace note to the Russian Soviet Govt. within a few days.

London, June 10th.—The drawings for the open golf championship, to be held at Deal, were made here last night. There are one hundred and sixty-eight professional and twenty-two amateur entries. Qualifying competitions will be played at Wilton and Weybridge on June 23rd and 24th and the championship matches will take place on the Deal links on June 30th and July 1st.

London, June 15th.—Sugar in stock on the 12th instant was 149,000 tons. Last 200 000 tons.

St. Thomas, June 17th.—Cable between Jamaica and Turks Island repaired, restoring the route via Bermuda.

Paris, June 13th.—Advices from Rouen state that the celebrations in honour of Joan of Arc were carried out with great brilliancy. On the porch of the Church of Stouen a delegate from the City of Orleans handed the Mayor of that city the standard of Joan of Arc, which was then carried in procession into the Church, the interior of which was decorated with the French and British colours. Cardinal DuBois presided at the religious ceremony in the presence of M. Bignon, Secretary of State, General Pereira, representative of King George, and delegations from all countries, notably Alsace Lorraine.

Paris, June 13th.—According to latest information from Rome, Count Storza will probably become Minister of Foreign Affairs. He is given credit for the happy development of opinion in England in favour of Italy, as reflected by the newspapers, chiefly those connected with Mr. Lloyd George. The anarchists and Socialists are intensifying their propaganda, and the agitation may oblige Signor Giolitti to at once re-apply repressive measures, thus compromising

him in the eyes of the proletarian masses.

Paris, June 13th.—The death has taken place, from pneumonia, of Madame Rejane, the celebrated actress.

London, June 14th.—M. Millerand has accepted an invitation from Mr. Lloyd George for an interview at Boulogne-sur-mer on the 21st instant.

Brussels, June 14th.—In connection with the military agreement between France and Belgium, the "Libre Belgique" states that an official meeting has taken place between Marshal Foch and General Maglines.

Paris, June 14th.—Official circles are still without confirmation of the reports of a counter-revolution in Russia. Wireless messages from Moscow received this morning continue to be indecipherable.

Paris, June 14th.—M. Venizelos, the Greek Premier, has left Paris for London.

Paris, June 14th.—The Swedish Govt. has sent a note to the Great Powers asking for an exchange of views regarding the question of the Aland Islands.

Paris, June 14th.—The Committee on Reparations announces that the actual deliveries of coal by Germany up to the 31st May are as follows:

France, 4,686,042 tons,
Italy 316,963 tons and
Belgium 98,553 tons.

Paris, June 14th.—The "Matin" states that at an International Conference for the protection of the Foreign creditors of Russia, in which the representatives of ten countries participated, the principle was maintained that all the states of the former Empire of the Czar's should undertake to satisfy the engagements of the former regime. It was also decided to oppose the resumption of commercial relations until an international agreement has been reached satisfying the claims of the holders of Russian obligations.

Rome, June 14th.—A new Ministry under the premiership of Signor Giolitti has been formed.

Paris, June 14th.—General Janin, who has arrived at Marseilles from Siberia, states that Admiral Kolchak succumbed to the errors and faults committed by himself, and that all that has been written about him is less than the truth. He added that the Czech troops received an imperative order from their Govt not to interfere in Siberian matters, and that the troops who wished to follow the Admiral could not do so, he being completely surrounded by Bolsheviks and other insurgents.

Paris, June 15th.—A despatch from Rome to the Temps states that the Albanian insurgents are continuing their attack on Avlona, but are being checked by the guns of the warships. Some small garrisons in the interior have surrendered to the insurgents. Severe comment is being made on the coincidence of the Albanian revolt with the general strike

at Bari, the railway strike in South East Italy and the events at Trieste, where the manifestants were provided with arms of Austrian origin.

Paris, June 16th.—A speech at the meeting of the Committee of Jurists appointed by the League of Nations and which met today at the Hague, M. Bourgeois declared that the Court of Justice should be a permanent one in order to be always able to reply to the call of the weak.
