LOCAL.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Nov. 25th.—The French Govt. is deeply aroused over the warning given to France by Lord Curzon, in his address in London yesterday, and his criticism of the French policy at the Washington Conference.

Washington, Nov. 24th.—United States officials are giving some thought to the possibility of salvaging as non-combatant naval, or as commercial craft, the three new battleships now afloat, but which would not be completed under Mr. Hughes naval limitation plans. They were hopeful that in fixing the methods of scrapping, the conferees will not make an arbitrary rule that would require the ships to be sunk, or totally destroyed. It is possible shipbuilding experts asserted today, that the Colorado, Washington and West Virginia could be converted into serviceable intermediate liners for commercial use purely. They would have an economical speed of 18 knots.

Washington, Nov. 24th.—The illness of another delegate to the armament conference was reported today. Lord

Lee of Fareham, First Lord of the Admiralty and ranking delegate to Mr. Balfour, head of the Great Britain delegation, was confined to his bed with a severe chill. It was said by British delegation members that it probably would be several days before Lord Lee would be able to resume his place in the conference discussions.

London, Nov. 24th.—The National Liberal Federation in Newcastle today adopted a resolution endorsing Secretary of State Hughes proposal for a ten year naval holiday, saying that the British representatives in Washington be instructed to support all practical projects for the progressive disarmament of all nations, and demanding the publication of all treaties. An attempt to include in the resolution an amendment demanding denunciation of the Anglo-Japanese Alliance, was defeated on the ground that, considering Japan's hearty cooperation at Washington, it was "inadvisable" to give Japan such curt and brusque notice.

Belfast, Nov. 25th.—Considerable forces of troops and special police are expected to arrive here today, to assist in quelling disorders which have raged intermittently for the last five days. The death-list for the series of outbreaks stood last night at twenty-seven after a day marked by the bombing of three tram-cars and desultory shooting, in which seven persons were killed and a number seriously injured.

New York, Nov. 25th.—M. Briand declined last night to comment on the speech of Lord Curzon in London yesterday. He was shown abstracts of the Foreign Minister's address at a dinner at the Lotus Club, where he spoke. "It will be impossible for me to make any comment on what Lord Curzon has said, without seeing the full extent of his speech", he said.

London, Nov. 25th. Surveying the entire stay of the Prince of Wales in Bombay after he departed from this City, the Daily Mail Bombay correspondent says, it was an unqualified success, and both the Prince and the people had every reason to be well content that all anticipatory misgivings were swept away by the tumultuous popular reception. Referring to the rioting, the correspondent says "I am unaware what impression it made in England. To us here, though deplorable, the whole thing was trivial. If any moral is to be drawn from it, it is of conditions that would be likely to prevail were there no British authority".

London, Nov. 25th.—The International shipping Conference, at its second session yesterday, adopted a resolution recommending the Hague rule of 1921 concerning bills of lading, for voluntary international application as far as may be necessary, for adoption by an international convention between the maritime countries.
