

lodge. Mr. Bonar Law in the House of Commons recently stated definitely that the contracts for the new warships did not go to the Clyde because the ship-builders there quoted too high a price.

Washington, Dec. 21st.—M. Clemenceau's United States visit added twenty thousand dollars to the American field service fellowships fund, Mr. Stephen Bonsall who managed the tour, announced today. The amount is the surplus of money received from lectures and newspaper articles by the "Tiger", after defraying the expenses of the trip. The war-time Premier, it was explained, was unwilling to accept financial assistance for his mission and his own means were inadequate, so he accepted lecture and writing contracts to pay his way. He expressed the desire that any surplus be devoted in memory of his student years in the United States to the fellowships, which are intended among other things to stimulate friendship between France and the United States through the education in each country of young men from the other.

London, Dec. 20th.—The lawn tennis teams of the nations taking part in the Davis Cup competitions, hereafter will be divided into two grounds, known as "American and European," ultimate winners in each group playing one another and the winner of this contest playing the holder for the cup. It was decided to admit Hawaii, the Philippines, New Zealand, Italy and Rumania to future Davis Cup competitions but the ban against Germany, Austria and Hungary, it is believed, will be maintained. Henceforth the United States team will be designated "the United States" instead of "American" as heretofore. With the five new nations admitted today the number of countries eligible to the Davis cup competition is increased to 18. It was definitely decided late in the session to exclude those countries which fought against the Entente in the world war.

London, Dec. 21st.—A despatch to the Times from Riga, says M. Stulginski has been elected President of Lithuania.

Rome, Dec. 21st.—Prof. Vincenzo Tanigorra, who resigned yesterday as Minister of the Treasury for reasons of health, died today.

London, Dec. 21st.—A despatch to the Times from Copenhagen says it is officially denied in the Danish Capital that the Russians have approached the Danish Government with a proposal to call a conference of the states interested with the idea of converting the Baltic into a closed sea for the warships of all nations, except those of the shore lines of which touch the Baltic.

London, Dec. 21st.—Mr. Bonar Law leaves tonight for Glasgow to fill the first of several speaking engagements in Scotland. He has been indisposed from a cold for the last few days, but at no time has it been severe enough to confine him to bed.

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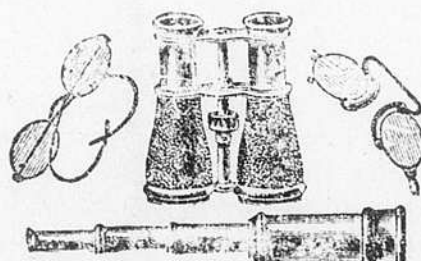
