ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Aug. 27th.—The situation at Danzig shows marked improvements and munitions are being unloaded, according to the Danzig correspondent of the London Times. It is asserted that there will be no difficulty in the future over the unloading and despatch of munitions to Poland.

New York, Aug. 26th.—The sugar markets have probably never in their history been in such chaotic condition as they are at the present time. Raw sugar, Cuba's full duties and Porto Rico's, have been received and holders find it impossible to even get a bid, the result being that the sugars have been placed in store waiting for an improvement in the market conditions. It was believed that a bid of ten cents cif would be accepted for full duty sugar, but no buyers could be found who would make any bid. It was said that a local refinery yesterday morning bid 9.03 cents cif for Porto Rico's, then withdrew the bid. The only hope for a more stabilized market appears to be the possibility that Europe will become an active buyer

of Cuba's raw and American refined sugar. This would tend to relieve the pressure to some extent. Then there was a report circulating in the trade that a large quantity of the Java sugar bought for future shipment to this country, has been re-sold to Europe and would not reach the United States at all. Brokers report a more active inquiry from abroad and a sale was reported of 5,000 tons of Cuba's prompt shipment for France, the price being uncertain but said to be from 10½c. to 10¾c. There was a press despatch saying that Brazil had practically lifted the embargo on sugar exports and that upwards of 30,000 bags were en route from Santos and Bahia to the United States. In refined sugar the demand continues poor and no further price changes are reported. Second offerings have been pretty well cleaned up around 15c. to 16½c., less 2%.
