past few days, was called off in London last night and resumption of work is expected today. The strike began in Hull on July 2nd, with a walkout of 7,000 men, and then extended to a dozen other ports and involved 40,000 workers. The ports affected included Manchester, Liverpool, Avonmouth and small towns, but did not affect Southampton or Swansea. Work was resumed in some ports by yesterday, but in others the strikers were still holding out. It is believed, however, that the whole strike will terminate by the end of this week.

Paris, July 11th.—The Senate this afternoon ratified the Washington treaty for the limitation of naval armaments, without reservations by a vote of 287 to 3. The Senate ratified the four-power Pacific pact by an unanimous vote. This treaty has been ratified by the Chamber and therefore likewise becomes effective.

Ottawa, July 12th.—Official announcement of the proposed visit of the Prince of Wales to Canada was made last evening from Government House. His Royal Highness, travelling as the Duke of Cornwall, proposes to visit Canada, spending a short holiday on his ranch in Alberta during early Autumn. The visit will be of a purely private nature and His Royal Highness regrets that it will not be possible for him to accept official engagements of any kind.

Washington, July 12th.—One hundred and seventy eight German submarines were "lost in action" during the war, according to an official report just received by the Navy Department. The loss in personnel is given as 6,364, of whom 515 were officers. These figures are believed by officials here to be the first authentic information on this subject to be obtained. Four years were consumed, the author of the report asserts, in checking official records and interviewing members of the German admiralty who had charge of undersea craft. Depth charges accounted for 37 submarines, fixed mines for 36, fights with enemy submarines 20, engine and other trouble 14, torpedo boat destroyers and subchasers 13, accidental ramming eight, armed fishing craft six, aeroplanes (bombing six) and anti-submarines six. 21 submarines were demolished, or otherwise disposed of, to prevent their capture by the enemy. Three were sunk by regular patrol vessels of the enemy, 3 by armed auxiliaries, 2 by cruisers, and 2 by artillery fire from the shore. One was sunk by a liner at the entrance to the British main base of Scapa Flow, the famous 229 under Captain Widdigen. A chart accompanying the report shows that 53 of the undersea boats were lost in the English Channel, 20 in the North Sea, 16 in the Mediterranean, 16 on the West coast of England, 12 off the Dutch coast, 3 near Heligoland, 2 in Scapa Flow and the remainder in far separated spots in the World oceans.

Of the boats interned before the German Fleet was delivered to the Allies, 5 were sold to Spain and two to Holland, while 14 were demolished. Inspection of the books of shipbuilding firms holding contracts showed that 281 submarines had been delivered and 197 were under construction when the armistice was signed.

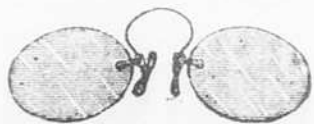
