London, June 14th.—The touring West
Indian XI started their eight match yester-
day at Darlington and scored 125
runs in their first innings. Durham re-
plied with 63. In their second innings
the West Indians had scored 41 runs at
close of play, for the loss of two wickets.

London, June 12th.—A despatch to the
Times from Jerusalem says ten British
gendarmes returning after having escort-
ed the High Commissioner, Sir Herbert
Samuel, to the northernmost Jewish col-
ony, Mutallah, were ambushed by bri-
gands. Two of the gendarmes were kill-
ed and two wounded and one was captur-
ed. A despatch to the Daily Mail from
Jerusalem says the attack occurred at
Ainlemerahan, near the Syrian frontier.
There is considerable anxiety in official
quarters regarding the safety of the
High Commissioner, who is camping
with an escort of native Palestine gen-
darmes, who took over the escort duty
