News From New York.

Capt. Sumner E. W. Kittelle believed by Virgin Islanders here to be the present Governor of the Virgin Islands has been nominated by President Harding for the rank of Rear Admiral.

Captain Kittelle was formerly commander of the battleships Georgia and Maryland.

The President also nominated Captains William V. Pratt and Louis M. Multoro to the same rank.

Capt. Pratt's home is in Belfast, Me.

The bluejackets and marines of two Japanese battle cruisers in port are having a gay time sight-seeing.

Vee-ly nice they say, vee-ly wonderful is New York.

There are 267 cadets with them, two of whom are princes. The ships will leave for the Azores on Nov. 8th

All New York is watching with intense interest the results of the mayoralty campaign which ends on Tuesday Nov. 8th Election Day.

Two candidates, the present Mayor John F. Hylan and Alderman Henry Curran are running for office.

It is believed by many that the former will make a clean sweep, due to the fact that he is totally against the increase of street car and subway fares from five to

ten cents, and which has won for him the admiration of the general public.

Aldermann Curran is a Republican, and said to be a friend of the big corporations who are trying to demand the increased fare.

Mr. Ashley L. Totten has received a letter from Mr. Robinson Editor of the Amsterdam News, assuring him of their willingness to aid in such publicity that will eventually bring about full citizenship rights for all Virgin Islanders.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

New York, Nov. 9th—Maryland and Kentucky have passed from Republican to Democratic control as a result of yesterday's elections as shown in returns available here this morning.

Albany, Nov. 9th—The Republican majority in the New York Assembly will be continued in 1922 as the result of yesterday's voting.

Washington, Nov. 9th.—Objections made by the British Govt. to the Loucheur Ratheneau agreement, under which Germany would pay a considerable part for reconstruction in Northern France, have been forwarded to Mr. Briand by cable. The protest represents that the agreement gives France a priority in payment over the Allies and this is injurious to British interests. Comment among members of the French delegation to the Armament Conference, is that it was really upon the suggestion of the British statesmen that the French Govt. authorized M. Loucheur to negotiate with Herr Ratheneau. The London point of view was that Germany could never pay more than a percentage of reparations in cash and that France ought to take products in part payment.

London, Nov. 9th.—In the Guildhall, in his opening remarks, the Prime Minister alluded to the economic troubles afflicting the world, such as followed the Napoleonic wars. He expressed the conviction that the force of the cyclone was already spent and followed with a recital of numerous symptoms indicating that a revival was coming, particularly the fact that "in every land the slackness that seemed to overcome labour is passing away. The world is settling down to work" said the Prime Minister, "and it is work alone that will fill the depleted tills which will enable purchasers to come to the markets. The blue sky is beginning to emerge, the Washington Conference summoned by President Harding is like a rainbow in the sky. For without the assurance of peace restoration of business is impossible. This conference come none too soon. So far the war has not had the effect which every sane man anticipated
