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TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Oct. 22nd.—The moon is slightly off its proper path and twelve miles ahead of its schedule, the astronomer Royal of Greenwich Observatory announced today. The study of this week's eclipse shows the moon to be out of line, probably due to some magnetic force unknown, he said.

Halifax, Oct. 22nd.—Under ideal weather conditions the first of this year's international schooner race series was started at nine o'clock this morning, between the American "Schooner Elsie" and the Canadian Schooner "Bluenose." The race, which was over a forty mile course was closely contested until on the last lap, when the "Bluenose" hauled away from her opponent, crossing the finishing line at 1. 33.06 p. m., followed by the "Elsie" at 1. 45.35 p. m., fully a mile behind the winner. The second race of the series will take place on Monday, weather conditions permitting.

Vienna, Oct. 23rd.—The exact situation in Hungary is now beyond the knowledge of the Austrian Foreign Office, which today lost communication with Budapest. All kinds of rumours are current, including the reported entry of former King Charles into Budapest, the defection of some of the Government forces and other conflicting information, but it is known beyond doubt that there has been brisk and possibly sanguinary fighting close to Budapest.

Berlin, Oct. 22nd.—The cabinet headed by Chancellor Wirth resigned office today.

Paris, Oct. 23rd.—Soldiers tonight hurriedly compelled the evacuation of all residences in the vicinity of Fort Auber-

villiers, two miles outside of Paris when fire broke out, causing explosions of gas and shells.

Sofia, Oct. 22nd.—M. Dimitroff Bulgarian Minister of War, was assassinated this morning while motoring near Kostendil, a resort forty three miles southwest of this city. His chauffeur and two companions were also killed.

Paris, Oct. 23rd.—Ten thousand soldiers and policemen guarded the United States Embassy and the neighbouring streets today, to prevent the threatened demonstration by the French Communists in the protest against the conviction in a Massachusetts court of Sacco and Vandetti, but no Communists appeared there.

Chicago, Oct. 23rd.—Officers of the Brotherhood of Railway clerks, freight handlers and station employers, with a membership of three hundred and fifty thousand, tonight joined the unions which voted not to go on strike, by adopting a resolution in which they refused authorization to walk out for the time being, the matter to be reconsidered after the Labour Board renders its rules and working conditions decision. This action brought the number of railway workers who will not strike to more than three-fourths of the country's total.

London, Oct. 22nd.—General Roxas, Commanding the Portuguese troops loyal to the Government which was ousted from office on Wednesday, is marching on Lisbon to suppress the revolutionary movement, says a brief despatch from Vigo to the "Times".

Vienna, Oct. 23rd.—The ex-Emperor Charles of Austria, arrived at Odenburg, in Burgenland, on Friday, in an aeroplane coming from Switzerland. It is reported that he will go to Buda Pest, accompanied by troops from Odenburg.

Buda Pest, Oct. 23rd.—According to a telephone message from Raab, a town situated on the Danube in North Hungary, the town was occupied by twelve thousand Royalist troops and a Royalist Cabinet was formed there. The Hungarian Regent, Admiral Horthy, is stated to have fled from Buda Pest upon learning of the arrival of the ex-Emperor in his former domain.

London, Oct. 24th.—Feeling over the attempt of the ex-Emperor Charles to regain the throne of Hungary is running high in Czecho Slovakia, it is said in despatches received in British official quarters from Prague.

Belgrade, Oct. 24th.—A Jugo-Slav force is being concentrated on the fron-

tier of Hungary and the Cabinet has decided upon the mobilization of three classes of recruits.

London, Oct. 24th.—The British Govt. has notified the Hungarian Govt. that the latter must take possible steps for the expulsion of ex-Emperor Charles from Hungary.

London, Oct. 24th.—An ultimatum has been sent to the Hungarian Govt. by Czecho Slovakia, giving the former forty eight hours to secure the removal of ex-Emperor Charles from that country according to a despatch from Vienna to the Exchange Telegraph Company.
