It is learned that the court has passed judgment in the case of our townsman Mr. Milton Jacobs who, it will be remem-

bered, had the misfortune some months ago while chauffeuring a motor truck to Frederiksted to collide with a horse and cart, the animal and one of the occupants of the cart being killed on the spot. The court has not sustained the charge of man-slaughter, and the sentence is understood to impose a fine of \$20.00, in which connection we take pleasure in congratulating Mr. Jacobs upon his having been dealt with in a manner merited by his moral standing in the case as viewed by the whole community whose full sympathy he has had, and whose sentiments were expressed in this paper shortly after the unhappy accident, through the medium of our contributor Mr. R. H. Amphlett Leader, postmaster of Frederiksted. We feel sure his experience has taught Mr. Jacobs, and probably many others, a severe lesson which will not be unlearned, and which should prove of profitable account to all in the future.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Antwerp, Aug. 20th.—In the opening events of the sixth day of the seventh Olympiad this morning, P. Hodge, one of the star distance men of the British team, won first place in the final heat of the 3,000 metres steeple-chase. Hodge made a splendid showing, although because of the weather conditions, his time was not remarkable, being 10 2/5 minutes. Patrick Flynn (U. S.) was second, Ambrossini (Italy) third, Mattson (Sweden) fourth, Davanney (U. S.) fifth and Hulsentsoch (U. S.) sixth.

London, Aug. 20th.—The Consistory at Rome has dictated to Archbishop Mannix of Melbourne a strong exhortation, urging moderation in his treatment of British political questions, according to an official message from Rome today.

New York, Aug. 20th.—J. W. H. Rason, Philadelphia, was chosen last night as the leader for the next four years of the fifteen million negroes in the United States by the Universal Negro Improvement Association, in convention here. Marcus Garvey, founder of the movement for the redemption of Africa for the Negro Race, was elected Provisional President of the African Continent. Rason told the assembly he would do all in his power to bring about Pro-Negro Legislation in the United States.

Paris, Aug. 20th.—The military successes of the Poles continued yesterday, according to a report to the Foreign Office today from the Military Mission in Warsaw under plans elaborated by the French General Weygand and his staff of more than 800 French officers. All these officers now are either actually in command of the forces that are freeing Warsaw from the Russian Soviet menace, or aiding the Polish Commander elsewhere.

Paris, Aug. 20th.—The successes of the Poles in throwing back the Bolsheviks in the battle of Warsaw was a "Polish Victory" the French General Weygand told a delegation at Warsaw who had come to tell him he was the most popular man in Poland, and was proclaimed by all the "Saviour of Warsaw."

Lucerne, Aug. 20th.—Mr. Lloyd George arrived here yesterday afternoon. To the correspondents of the Associated Press, he said that up to the present the only official meeting that had been arranged was one with Signor Giolitti, the Italian Premier. This would probably take place next Monday. No visits from Dr. Simons, the German Chancellor, or King Feisal of Syria, have yet been arranged, he said. The Swiss Police have taken measures to protect the British Premier, declaring they have discovered a plot against his life.

Warsaw, Aug. 20th.—Brest-Litovsk has been occupied by the Polish Army.
