TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Delayed in Transmission.

Warsaw May 31st.—Advices from Bytom state that on Friday armed German bands attempted an incursion into the eastern territory and took possession of the meeting-place of the Polish plebiscite committee at Bytom, but were ejected by the Poles, who inflicted losses on them. The bands then attacked the Polish hotel, using hand grenades, to which the Poles replied by rifle fire, four Germans being killed and several wounded.

Rome May 31st.—The Pope has addressed an encyclical to the Episcopate of the entire world, on Christian reconciliation and peace. He declares that despite the end of the war the germs of rancor still exist, and he exhorts all Christians to forget these hatreds and to make room for mutual happiness and concord. The document exposes the danger the world runs if its people continue to live in a state of hostility.

Berlin, May 31st.—In consequence of many reports in circulation concerning a new coup d'etat, the Minister of the Reichswehr summoned the commanders of the Berlin garrison, who solemnly declared that they were ready to defend the constitution by arms, if necessary.

against any revolutionary attempt, right or left. The Minister thanked them for their loyalty.

Paris, June 1st.—Advices from Beyrout state that a French column on its way to re-establish communication with Aintab, encountered between Killis and Aintab a strong contingent composed of Turkish irregulars, who were completely defeated, many prisoners, including a colonel and two majors, being taken and flags and much booty captured, the enemy also leaving twelve hundred dead on the field. The column then occupied Aintab.

St. Thomas, June 3rd.—General Superintendent's Office. The chartered cableship "Viking", having repaired a break in the cable between Jamaica and San Juan, P. R., near Jamaica, is now engaged on a second break in the same section, located in deep water. The repair of this break will, it is expected, restore communication with Jamaica and points beyond, and it is hoped that the operations will be successful at an early date.

Paris, June, 1st.—The newspapers publish a despatch from Warsaw announcing that the Polish Diet has decided to sever diplomatic relations with Czecho-Slovakia and demand the removal of Czecho-Slovak workmen from the region where the plebiscite has to decide the question of attachment to Poland or Czecho-Slovakia. Commenting on this information, the "Matin" remarks that the news is surprising, because negotiations are being conducted in Paris between representatives of the two countries and appear about to be concluded. The Polish representative, M. Piltz, upon being interviewed, declared he was astounded at the information, which was entirely contrary to telegrams he had received yesterday from Warsaw.

Paris, June 1st.—The "Petit Journal" states that in certain political circles the question is being discussed of convocation of a Congress at Versailles with a view to modifying the constitution by the institution of a Vice-Presidency of the Republic.

Paris June 1st.—The "Matin" says a consultation of eminent physicians has found that President Deschanel is not suffering from any serious injury and that a few weeks rest will suffice to effect a complete cure. The "Journal" states that although resting, the President will continue to keep himself au courant with public affairs and will preside, whenever necessary, at ministerial Councils, that will abstain from official ceremonies.

Paris June 1st.—The "Petit Parisien" states that Mr. Lloyd George in his discussions with M. Krassin, the Chief of the Soviet Trade Delegation, remained strictly within economic limits and that M. Millerand, on being invited to participate in the discussions, declared that he wished to adhere to the engagements
