London, July 16th—The At Home given by the Hon. H. V. Myers O. B. E. and Miss Myers on the afternoon of the fourteenth in the Jamaica Court of the West Indies section at the Wembley Exhibition and which was honored by the presence of His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales passed off most successfully. It was attended by nearly eight hundred guests, including the Duke of Devonshire, Lord Burnham, Mr. Walter Gibley, Sir Travers Clark, Lord Olivier, Lord Rutherford, Mr. Algernon Aspinall, Sir Edward Davason, Mr. S. Baldwin, Honorable D. S. Gideon, Mr. Arthur Farquharson, Mr. E. W. Lucie-Smith, Mr. Lew Ashenheim, Mr. C. De Cordova, Mr. J. De Cordova, Mr. L. De Cordova, Mr. J. H. Allwood, Mr. O. B. E. Dr. Layson, Clifford and the Commissioners of the various West Indian and other colonial sections of the exhibition, as well as some two hundred Jamaicans at present in London. His Royal Highness was most interested and intimated his regret at not having been able to visit Jamaica during his tour four years ago. The grounds were most tastefully arranged and musical selections were played by the band of the West India Regiment, which was inspected by the Prince of Wales and Mr. Myers. Typical Jamaican dishes were served in the buffet and refreshment tents. The Prince graciously accepted three Jipba Jipba hats manufactured at the Exhibition, as a gift of the colony. They were presented to His Royal Highness by Miss Myers. A walking stick was also presented jointly to the Prince by Miss De Cordova and Miss Allwood.
