FROM THE POLICE.

ALL owners of dogs are enjoined with-in the ending of January month to procure from the Police Office (for Kingshill District from Kingshill Police Station) the signs for dogs prescribed by the Police Regulations, which according to same must always be worn by the dog, and for which Franes 10.00 must be paid for the dogs in town and Franes 2.00 for those in the country.

After said time dogs met not wearing the sign for 1922 will be caught and brought to the Police Office (Kingshill Police Station) and detained for 3 times 24 hours, when it will be killed, unless the owner appears to claim the dog, pays a fine of Franes 15.00, and eventually procure the required sign.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Washington, Dec. 21st.—A suggestion was made in the British Arms circles of the conference today that it might be necessary for President Harding to call another conference to deal with the por-

tion of the agreement on naval ratio which prohibits the further construction of warships. The British view is that there is some doubt as to whether the provision in its present shape is sufficiently definite to prevent nationals of the Powers represented at the present conference from constructing warships in other countries not a party to the agreement. The British declared that as an example, one of the great British shipbuilding concerns has dockyards in Spain, another in Norway and others were located in other countries. Under liberal construction of the ratio agreement, there would be nothing to prevent the utilization of these dockyards to build warships, it was said, and the present conference cannot prevent this in the absence of delegates from all of the countries where shipbuilding plants are located. Hence it is suggested by the British that it may be necessary to call another conference for the purpose of meeting this condition, although it was said in another quarter that the needs of the case might be met through the extension by this conference of an invitation to unrepresented Powers to adhere to the agreement reached on this point.

Cairo, Egypt, Dec. 23rd.—Cairo bristled with police and troops tonight and airplanes circled over the delta of the Nile following disturbances in connection with the forcible removing of Said Zaglour Pasha a nationalist leader by the authorities to Suez early today. His removal came as a result of his refusal to obey an order issued by the military authorities that he and his chief followers cease all political activities and leave Cairo. Although much wanton destruction occurred during the disturbances the authorities claim that the incident is relatively unimportant and that the situation need not be regarded with particular anxiety.

Calcutta, India, Dec. 28rd.—A hartal of a completely non-violent character lasting for twenty-four hours was declared yesterday for Dec. 24th, the occasion of the visit of the Prince of Wales to the city.

Washington, Dec. 23rd.—The sentence of ten years' imprisonment imposed on Euge D. V. Debs, Socialist leader, following his conviction of violating the espionage act, was committed today by President Harding. Debs, who several times was a candidate for President, was convicted on three counts out of his alleged obstructionist activities during the wars but when his appeal reached the Supreme Court that tribunal acted only upon that dealing with the interference with recruiting, which the Govt. charges resulted from the speeches of the Socialist leader. Debs was ordered released from Atlanta penitentiary by President Harding, along with twenty-three other persons convicted of similar offences.

Dublin, Dec. 23rd.—The decision of
