ST. CROIX STATION.

Honolulu, Sept. 1st.—The cholera has spread from Tokio to Yokohama where several cases have been discovered according to cable advices received here.

Ottawa, Sept. 1st.—Under a smiling blue sky and the strains of "Oh Canada" His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales this morning laid the corner stone of the Peace Tower of the new parliament building. Following the laying of the corner stone, the prince inspected the Ottawa War Veterans.

Hanover, Prussia, Aug. 30th.—(Associated Press) Addressing a delegation of students here on the occasion of the fifth anniversary of the battle of Tannenberg Field Marshal Von Hindenburg said: "If five years ago I was permitted to win a brilliant victory it was due to the dispensation of providence and the spirit of the troops assigned to me. We must hold on to this spirit in the sad days which are now overcoming us. We must not lose courage. We must again become that which we once were when in Versailles the new German Empire was proclaimed. I being among those permitted to join in the first three cheers for the Emperor. The spirit of these days must not be lost to us in these days of laxity and falseness."

Copenhagen, September 2nd.—The Lithuanian Legation announces that the Bolsheviks have been surrounded on the Lithuanian front. They are offering to make peace with Lithuania, whose advance continues.

Paris, Sept. 2nd.—The Fiume problem will be solved by an agreement that the city will become a buffer State with an extended hinterland, according to an in-

The article declares Fiume will be under a regime which will assure the Italians character of the city being governed by a Council composed of two Italians, two Jugo-Slavs and one citizen of Fiume. The city of Zara, it is said, will be made free. Italy, according to the interview, will renounce her sovereignty over the territory of Tibesti in the central part of the Sahara desert, but will receive concessions from the French in herak' a Asia Minor, where there is a coal-field and in Anatolia.

Wellington, 1 Sept. 2nd.—The Peace Treaty with Germany was unanimously ratified today by Parliament, after members of the Labour Party had criticized the pact.

Paris, Sept. 2nd.—The Aegean seaport, access to which the Allies have decided to give Bulgaria, under the Peace Treaty, in Dedeagatch, together with the railway leading to that port.

London, Sept. 2nd.—The following diplomatic appointments are announced. Ambassador to Italy, Sir George W. Buchanan. Ambassador to Spain, Sir Esme W. Howard. Minister to the territory of the Serbs, Croats and Slovenes, Sir Chas. A. Young. Minister to the Netherlands, Sir Ronald W. Graham. Minister to Poland, Sir Horace G. M. Rumbold. Minister to Switzerland, Mr.

London, Sept. 2nd.—Associated Press. The Morning Post says it is probable that the first Dominion to appoint a resident Minister under the Imperial Conference proposal, will be Canada. Although no decision has been definitely made, the paper adds, it is possible the office of the High Commissioner would be coupled with the resident Minister and the business part of the High Commissioners Office vested in the Canadian Trade Mission.

London, Sept. 2nd.—The destroyer Victoria was torpedoed and sunk in the Baltic Sea on Saturday Aug. 30th. The Admiralty announced today. Eight of her complement are missing.

Rio de Janeiro, Sept. 2nd.—The British cableship Colonia arrived here on Sunday after having completed the laying of a new cable from England by way of Ascension, St. Vincent and Fayal.

Washington, Sept. 2nd.—A cotton crop of 11,230,000 bales this year was forecasted today by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture which based its estimate on the condition of the crop on August 25th., which it announced as 61.4% of a normal crop.
