DEATH OF MRS. BARTHOLOMEW BORN.

We regret to announce the sad news of the death in Trinidad yesterday of Mrs. Bartholomew Bornn.

The deceased, who was a native of this island and the widow of the late Mr. Bartholomew Bornn, had attained the ripe age of 81 years.

Mrs. Bartholomew Bornn was married on May 14, 1857, to Mr. Bornn who predeceased her two years ago, likewise at a ripe old age—84.

The issue of their marriage were seven children, thirteen of whom with thirty-nine grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren are alive today.

Of those thirteen children only one is resident here now—Widow A. Bornn. While another Mrs. C. Lumsden, is spending a vacation.

Mrs. Bornn was a splendid helpmate of her husband, being, along with him, a consistent Christian character, she evinced much interest in the welfare of others.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, March 29th.—Mr. Lloyd George himself will introduce the eagerly awaited resolution on the Genoa Conference next Monday on which the Government will ask for a vote of confidence, it was announced. The terms of the resolution are as follows. "Resolved that the House approve the resolutions passed by the Supreme Council at Cannes as a basis of the Genoa Conference and will support His Majesty's Government in endeavouring to give effect to them.

Ottawa, March 29th.—A resolution, amounting to a vote of confidence, moved in the House yesterday by Colonel Arthur and seconded by Mr. H. H. Stevens, both Conservatives, was defeated by a vote of 162 to 42. The majority of 120 secured by the Government is stated to be the largest registered on a non-confidence motion since confederation. Opinion in the corridors last night is that it peculiarly illustrates the strength of a solid progressive vote cast in a House constituted like the present. The resolution was in amendment to a vote to go into supply. It brought up again the question of whether or not Liberals, prior to the elections, had promised cash bonuses to returned men.

Berlin, March 28th.—Chancellor Wirth told the Reichstag today that the demand by the Allied Reparations Commission, for an additional tax levy of 80,000,000 marks, transmitted to the German Government last week, was absolutely impossible. Dr. Wirth said the Reparations Commission by granting a moratorium, might have contributed to the stabilization of Germany's financial position but that by its conditions it had done the opposite, although perhaps unwittingly.

London, March 29th.—Sir Robert Horne, stated in the House of Commons yesterday that this country is now drinking 19 gallons per head of beer against 2.61 in 1913, and point 7 gallons of spirits against point 39. Colonel Ashley, Coalition Unionist, asked the Chancellor if he was aware that the Postwar beer contained no alcohol. "I am not as familiar as the gallant member with the subject" the Chancellor replied.

London, March 29th.—The Rev. John N. Andersen of Edinburgh, the oldest Missionary in the world died yesterday. He was one hundred years of age. He was the father of the Church of Scotland Act, which was passed in 1921 by Parliament to prepare the way for the Union of the Presbyterian Churches in Scotland. The Act declared the lawfulness of certain articles declaratory of the constitution of the Church of Scotland.

Dublin, March 29th.—Michael Collins last evening, prior to his departure for
