

of all kinds of property which is or may be subject to taxation under the laws of this municipality, to which schedule he may add, such interrogations as he may deem proper for the purpose of securing a full disclosure of all such property.

PROPERTY SUBJECT TO TAXATION.

Section 13.—All property not herein expressly exempted from taxation shall be assessed and taxed. For the purposes of the assessment and collection of taxes real property shall be deemed to be synonymous with immovables, which are defined as follows:

IMMOVABLES DEFINED

Section 14.—Immovables are, in general, those which cannot move themselves or be removed from one place to another. This definition, strictly speaking, is applicable only to such things as are immovable by their own nature, and not to such as are so only by the disposition of law; provided, however, that things immovable may be made movable by contract.

WHAT THINGS MAY BE IMMOVABLE.

Section 15.—Things may be immovable either by their own nature or by their destination or the object to which they are applicable.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, June 24th.—In the House of Commons last night, the Govt. assenting voted to reduce the salary of the Minister without portfolio from 5,000 pounds 2,500. The vote was taken without division. Prior to the vote Mr. Lloyd George had informed the House that the Govt. would not retain him after the present session. Recently there has been considerable agitation in the papers against the election of Dr. Addison with a salary of 5,000 pounds.

Damascus, Syria, June 24th.—An attempt was made yesterday to assassinate General Gouraud, commander of the French army in the east, as he was travelling in an automobile from Damascus to the Sea of Galilee, in northern Palestine. The assault was committed by bandits. The general was uninjured but had a narrow escape, bullets passing through his left sleeve. The governor of Damascus, who was with him in the automobile was slightly wounded. The bandits had disguised themselves as gendarmes.
