Oppau explosion would not have occurred had no experimental work connected with the manufacture of engines of war in some shape or form been indulged in there.

Belfast, Oct. 19th.—Any attempt to lessen the power and the authority of the Ulster Parliament would be resisted to the last ditch, declared Mr. Pollock, Finance Minister of the Ulster Govt., here yesterday. He added that there was no valid reason that he could see why North and South Ireland should not live side by side in perfect amity and

friendship. "When, in the process of time", he continued, "the wider and sounder elements in the South rid this country of those who are working for its undoing, the opportunity may arise for a discussion of closer unity. They must learn once for all, however, that force will be met by force, and any attempt to interfere with Ulster's sovereign constitutional rights will provoke only deadly resistance.

London, Oct. 19th.—It is stated in official circles that statements made by the London Daily Express regarding the

possibility of the establishment of a new powerful, Far Eastern fleet merely arose from certain routine movements of ships to the Far East. The Morning Post says that although it can be certainly assumed that while the establishment of a Far Eastern fleet was discussed at the recent London conference, it was officially stated that no definite decision in the imperial navy policy would be taken until after the Washington conference.

London, Oct. 19th.—The Daily Mail for some time has been conducting a campaign against shop keepers alleging that they are guilty of profiteering. Lord Beaverbrook's paper, addressing the traders federation, declared that the first object ought to be the restoring of some trade, a low bank rate to cheapen money, extension of credit and lower income, sugar and tea taxes. These factors have been ignored, he stated in the making of loose charges against the retailers.

Paris, Oct. 19th. The French Govt. has decided that before the body of the American unknown soldier is taken aboard the "Olympic" the cross of the Legion of Honour is to be laid on the coffin as a tribute from France. M. Maginot, the minister of pensions, who was severely wounded in the war, will perform the ceremony. At the Arlington National Cemetery Marshal Foch, on Armistice Day will lay on the soldiers grave the French military medal and the war cross. Thus the three highest French military decorations will be accorded to the unknown dead.

London, Oct. 19th. The Australians defeated the Leeds team of the Northern Rugby Union this afternoon by 11 to 5.

London, Oct. 19th.—Mr. Graham R. A. of Western St. Andrews, Scotland, the well known Artist died today.

London, Oct. 19th.—The Irish affairs will probably be discussed in the House of Commons next Thursday through the willingness of the Govt. to allow one day to the Irish situation if the House should express a general desire for such a discussion. Captain Craig, representative for South Antrim declared in the House yesterday that Sir James Craig, the Ulster Premier, and other Ministers had asked him to press the Govt. to give an opportunity to consider the position of Ulster. He said he wished especially to take up the delay encountered in handing over the administration department of the Ulster Govt. to the new Belfast Parliament.

London, October 19th.—A military movement against the Portuguese Govt. broke out in Lisbon today, according to a Vigo despatch to the London Times. The troops seized strategic positions in the city and environs.

Demerra, Oct. 19th.—It is announced that Dr. J. H. Conyers Surgeon General to this Colony has tendered his resignation through ill health.
