The information which we gave out
yesterday concerning the S. S. Parima
must evidently have been wrong, for the
Cable Office bulletin board contains an
advice this morning of her arrival in St.
Thomas at 8.30 last night. At this rate
she may be looked for in Frederiksted
late today or by daybreak tomorrow.

Not long ago we called attention to
the lack of skilled veterinary aid on the
island and in showing the value of such

cious wounding of animals in the coun-
try. Yesterday we learnt of another
instance in which a horse was cruelly
stabbed at Est. "Fredensborg" on Satur-
day, this constituting the third such
offence within a few months. It is al-

the poor beasts. Surely there is field
here for a campaign against cruelty to
the lower animals.

TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Sep. 12th.—The Cunard Line
has embarked on a large building pro-
gramme, involving the construction of
more than half a million tons of ship-
ping. The object is to compete with
the United States in the shipping trade.
Orders already have been placed for a
number of new ships of an average
tonnage of 20,000 gross tons. These ves-
sels will burn oil and be equipped with
the most modern refrigerating plant.

Dublin, Sept. 12th.—An extensive po-
lice and military movement against the
Sinn Fein began this afternoon. The
scope and the object of the operations
were not revealed, but raids by the Gov-
ernment forces are reported through-
out the country. There were many ar-
rests and seizures of arms.

Galway, Ireland, Sept. 12th.—A large body
of police and soldiers searched the houses
of Sinn Fein leaders here today. Docu-
ments of a political nature were seized.

Belfast, Sept. 12th.—Military and po-
lice activity was everywhere in evidence
today against the Sinn Fein organiza-
tion. Raids were carried out in Belfast,
at Lisburn, Derry, Dundalk Louth and
Enniskillen. A quantity of high-explo-
sive gelatine was seized at the Derry
Sinn Fein headquarters.
