ST. CROIX STATION.

Vienna, Dec. 6th.—Dr. Karl Renner, the Chancellor, has been notified by the Supreme Council at Paris, that it is willing to receive him personally to plead his country's dangerous plight. Dr. Renner will beg for immediate help proposing as an alternative the retirement of the present government and the election by the Allies of a neutral dictator and administrative staff to govern the country.

Copenhagen, Dec. 6th.—The Soviet authorities in Russia have punished by death the individual held immediately responsible for the execution of former Emperor Nicholas and his family at Ekaterinburg in June 1918, when the Czecho-Slovaks were approaching that city where the imperial personages were then being held prisoners, according to a despatch to the Politiken today. The message quotes the Bolshevik newspaper Pravda of Moscow as the authority for this statement.

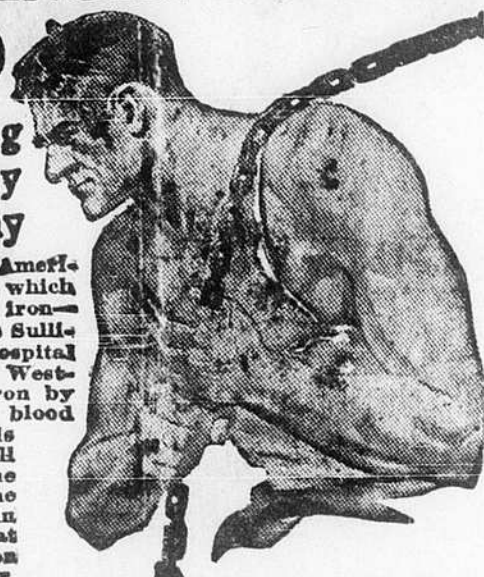
Paris, Dec. 6th.—Action was taken by the Supreme Council today toward food relief for Austria and Armenia. The Council took cognizance in this connection of resolutions adopted by the Supreme Economic Council, some of the most important of which dealt with the provisioning of these two nations. Immediate measures towards carrying out this relief into effect have been taken, it was stated.

London, Dec. 6th.—The Amalgamated Cotton Mills Trust is increasing its capital from 11,000,000 to 12,300,000 by the issue of 1,300,000 ordinary shares of one pound each.
