TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION

Ottawa, June 2nd.—Further restriction of Japanese immigration into Canada is under consideration by the Govt. This was revealed today in the House of Commons, when a question regarding Oriental immigrants was asked. Mr. Stevens asked if the Govt. had received representations from retail merchants in British Columbia, asking the same restrictions on Japanese as now exist in reference to Chinese and what the Govt. intended to do about it. The Minister of Immigration replied that such representations had been received and the question of the advisability of further restricting Japanese immigration is under consideration.

Washington, June 2nd.—The Presi-

dent today signed the Tax reduction Bill, but declaring it unsatisfactory, announced he would bend all his energies to obtain enactment of a better measure at the next session of Congress. The bill, which decreases the tax rate in most instances to the lowest levels since 1917 and which was the basis of the hottest fight of the present session of Congress, was declared by the President, in a 2,500 word statement issued coincident with his approval of the measure, to represent merely tax reduction, not tax reform.

Washington, June 2nd.—Japan's solemn protest against the exclusion section of the new immigration law was formally presented to Secretary Hughes on Saturday by Ambassador Hanihara and was made public at the State Department without comment.

Durban S. A. June 2nd.—Over five hundred persons packed the Town Hall here Saturday night to hear General Smuts election appeal, but disturbances organized by a majority, created such pandemonium that the Premier, eventually left the hall without speaking. Subsequently he addressed a small open-air meeting of his supporters and said the Red Flag has come to South Africa and free speech and the fundamental rights of free citizens are denied us. This night will be more than any speech of mine to arouse public realization to the dangers from past rule. The Premier denied that the disturbers were merely hooligans and declared that everything had been carefully organized. It was a well thought out and well executed scheme of anarchy. He pointed out that the same thing had happened at Bloemfontein and elsewhere. He spiritedly appealed to the law abiding citizens to rouse themselves and not to submit to the degradation of their public life and not sit still while the seeds of revolution were being sown. He added "the red light is up. There is danger to all we hold dear. Denial of civil rights will be followed by revolution and ultimately session. I ask you to vote decisively on June 17th, in order that these dangers may be effectively removed from our young country.

Paris, June 2nd.—Switzerland defeated Italy, two goals to one, in an Olympic soccer contest this afternoon, thus making the way into the semi-finals. A crowd of 150,000 persons saw the game.

London, June 3rd.—The King today celebrated his 59th birthday, receiving a multitude of felicitations from friends and officials. The newspapers printed the customary laudatory and congratulatory articles. His Majesty this morning witnessed the annual military ceremony, the "trooping of the colours" by regiments of foot guards, after which he planned to leave for Epsom for the opening of the races. He intends to stay at Epsom for the entire four days of racing.

Tokio, June 3rd—Captain Doisy, who

arrived at Mukden yesterday, left there at five o'clock this morning and has arrived at Hing Yang, northern Korea.

London, June 3rd.—Mr. MacDonald who was asked in the House of Commons yesterday whether the Government had made the representations to Germany that the appointment of Admiral Von Tirpitz to high office would be resented by the Allies. The Prime Minister replied that the Government would not neglect its duty in this or any similar respect.

London, June 3rd.—(British United Press) Torrential rains are sweeping England. They have already been the cause of several deaths and enormous damage to the growing crops. They have had the effect of cutting off the gas and electric supply of many midland towns and villages. To thousands of persons the damage to life and property is a secondary consideration compared with the effect of the rain on the Derby, which is run tomorrow. In spite of the efforts of the stewards and the employment of any arms of workmen it is certain that the course will be dangerous, especially in the vicinity of the famous Tottenham corner. If further rain falls, there will be sudden last minute changes in the betting order. Much satisfaction is felt because the King has decided to run his horse, Knight of the Garter.

Lake Hurst, N. J. June 3rd.—The dirigible Shenandoah was cut loose from her mooring mast this morning and immediately was headed to yard Newark on her trip to Albany, the Canadian border and Central New York and Pennsylvania towns.

London, June 4th.—Derby results. (Flash Bulletin) Sansovino 1st, St. German 2nd Hurstwood 3rd.

New York, June 3rd.—A further decline of 1/7 occurred in the raw sugar market today, under more liberal offerings, spot prices now being quoted at 5.09 duty paid. Sales included 40,000 bags of Porto Rican at 5.15, 12,000 bags Cuban at 5.12, also 22,500 bags Cuban and 25,000 bags of Porto Rican at 5.09 all for June shipment to local refiners. Raw sugar futures were easier under scattered liquidation and hedge selling, prompted by the decline in the spot market. Refined futures were nominal.

Navaski, June 3rd.—Captain Doisy, flying from Paris to Tokio, made the jump from Mukden to Pingyang, in northern Korea, in three and a half hours today. Hopping off from the Manchurian City, at five a. m. he reached the ancient Korean City, about 275 miles distant at 8.30 a. m. he expects to start for Taiku, Korea, tomorrow.

Durban, June 3rd Col. Bydell, Deputy Leader of the Labour forced in the South African Union, in a speech last night strongly denounced the rowdyism which has prevailed at meetings addressed by General Smuts and other South African party leaders.
