

U. S. N. PRESS NEWS.

CHICAGO: Word was being awaited here today from Department of Justice agent: who were sent yesterday to points in Illinois and Northern Indiana in search of men alleged to be radical anarchists whose names became known through the arrest here Wednesday night of Nicholas Jazinski and John Holony in whose possession great quantities of anarchists literature were found.

WARSAW: A new insurrection against the Russian Soviet Govt. has broken out in the district of "Nizhni Novgorod", 265 miles northeast of Moscow, according to information given out by the mission colony in this city. The insurrection which was started by the socialists revolutionary party embraces great masses of peasants and is reported to be spreading in all directions. It is declared to be independent of other counter-revolutionary movements.

RIGA: Delegates of Poland and Soviet Russia who held a long session last night in an effort to reach an agreement for an armistice, resumed their efforts today. Several points yet to be settled principally the interial which is to elapse after signature and date armistice is effective.

BERLIN: The inter-allied Commission tried to seize the Zeppelin, super-airplane which has just been completed for proposed trip from Berlin to New York. The constructor of the plane refused to give it up declaring that the power of the entente to condemn airplanes as being against the armistice regulation expired six months after signing of that agreement.

YORK, IRELAND: Part of the city hall here was destroyed by bomb this morning, six explosions were heard and was followed by considerable rifle-fire; so far as known they were no casualties.

CARNAREON, WALES: Lloyd George in a speech here today concerning the situation in Ireland referred to reprisals. He argues that the police in Ireland does not shoot without provocation. The Premier said that 238 policemen had been shot, of whom 109 had been shot dead and the patience of the police had given away with the result that they shot back. "We hope first to restore order in Ireland even by war methods". The premier declared otherwise that the whole country would fall into complete anarchy.

WASHINGTON: Announcement that Govt. owned vessels will be allocated to the American ship and commerce corporation for the operation on the former German trade route under the agreement of the Hamburg American Line when the corporation makes application for them, was made last night by Admiral Benson Chairman of the Shipping Board.

TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Riga, Oct. 8th.—The meeting of the Polish and Bolshevik delegates to the Peace Conference which took place here today, adjourned at an early hour without having signed the armistice. No date has been arranged for the next meeting of the Conference.

Paris, Oct. 8th.—At a meeting of the Egyptian Nationalists Party held in this city it was decided to accept, with one important reservation, the plan of the British Govt. for Egyptian independence the Egyptians insisting upon the complete elimination from the Versailles or any other treaties of any reference to British protectorate over Egypt.

Constantinople, Oct. 8th.—Turkish forces are reported to be attacking the Armenian headquarters on the Araxes River and are also planning an attack on Batum, which is held by the Georgians.

London, Oct. 8th.—A despatch from Milan reports that twenty-five persons were killed by the wrecking of an express train in a collision between that city and Venice.

Brussels, Oct. 8th.—The International Finance Conference, which has been sitting in this city, has adjourned. The delegates are stated to be optimistic over the outlook, as a result of the meetings.

Washington, Oct. 8th.—American warships in the Baltic have reported that two Bolshevik submarines are off the Estonian Coast, their purpose, it is surmised, being to endeavour to interrupt the shipment of war materials to Poland.

Washington, Oct. 8th.—The Navy Department reports that as the result of the expenditure of nearly one million one hundred thousand dollars for health sanitation during the year, the death rate of the Dominican Republic shows a great decrease.

Kansas, Oct. 8th.—At a meeting held here last night, to which thousands of persons were unable to gain admittance, Senator Harding was cheered for more than six minutes. During an address yesterday the Senator spoke in favour of agricultural reforms.

Louisville, October 8th.—Governor Cox was given an ovation here yesterday. During the day he delivered thirteen addresses and charged Senator Harding with continually shifting his position regarding the League of Nations.

Washington Oct. 8th.—Bids have been received for only four ships of the Government's wooden fleet of 285 vessels. The Shipping Board announces that two hundred of its ships are to

remain tied up indefinitely in the James River.

Allenstein, East Prussia, Oct. 8th.—Upon the departure for Paris of the Inter-allied Commission of Control which for the past six months had been directing the Government of East Prussia, their mission having come to an end, the whole of this city hoisted flags, not of the German republic, but of the old German Empire. The authority of the Commission terminated at eight o'clock in the night and at the same instant the flags appeared on all buildings. At a school facing the quarters occupied by the Commission the Director had assembled his pupils and at that hour addressed them, declaring that the moment was an historical one for Prussia, which at last saw the end of the oppression of the conquerors. Upon the termination of his address, the Imperial flag floated above the school and the pupils sang "Deutschland über Alles", the crowds gathered around the building joining in the chorus.

London, Oct. 8th.—Mr. MacSweeney passed a better night last night and had some sleep, but he appears weaker and more exhausted, according to the bulletin of the Irish League. Although he appears to be strong enough to speak, he was only able to pronounce some words without meaning or clearness.

Vienna, Oct. 8th.—The Hungarian Minister of the Interior has ordered the immediate expulsion of all Jews in Hungarian territory who have arrived here since 1914. During the recent Jewish religious festivals the soldiery of the Hungarian Army entered the Synagogues and ill-treated the worshippers and many persons were assaulted on the streets by the populace and the soldiers.

On August 1 the Administrator of Dominica issued a proclamation, prohibiting under severe penalties, the exportation of flour, bread, biscuits, arrowroot, ground provisions of all kinds, peas, beans, and farine, fruit such as mangoes, avocados, plantains, and banana also onions and charcoal. —The Dominica Chronicle.—Agricultural News.

In China the swine industry is, of animal industries, next in importance to that of raising poultry. It is difficult to ascertain the number of pigs raised there each year, and all estimates are little more than rough guesses. A conservative estimate of pigs raised annually in China would be 100,000,000. At the low price of \$12 each, which is the average amount received for pigs sold on the market, the annual pig crop of China would thus have a value of \$1,200,000,000. Most of the hogs exported are sent to Hong-Kong and to Russia (The Journal of Heredity.—Ibid.
