Athens, Nov. 15th.—The late ex King Alexander's marriage with Aspasia Manos has been declared valid by the court here which dismissed the opposition of former King Constantine and ordered the seals of the apartments of the late monarch broken. Madame Manos will inherit Alexander's personal property.

Paris, Nov. 15th.—Sebastopol has fallen, the Russian Bolshevik having occupied the city last night, according to an official information received by the French Foreign Office. The Bolsheviks are reported to be masters of the whole Crimean Peninsula.

London, Nov. 14th.—As Great Britain has never recognized the Wrangel Government in South Russia and is now proceeding with negotiations aiming at the opening of trade relations with Soviet Russia, the British navy will continue to observe strict neutrality in the Black Sea, it was stated today. Reports from Constantinople that the British navy would assist in the blockade of the Black Sea ports were denied by the Admiralty. British ships have not yet been called to transport refugees from the Crimea and the Admiralty said today that it had not been decided whether they would assist in getting the refugees away.

New York, Nov. 12th.—Refined sugar took another price drop yesterday, the Federal reporting a decline of $\frac{1}{2}$ c. per pound to 10c. less 2% which represents a decline of practically 15c. per pound from the high price reached last June. Raw sugar also turned weaker and declined $\frac{1}{2}$ c. representing a decline of about 17c. since last May.

London, Nov. 15th.—Mr. William Brace, one of the moderate leaders of the miners in Great Britain, has accepted a Govt. post in the miners dept. at a salary of £2,700 a year. Mr. Brace and others like him, greatly offended the extremists miners by the recent strike settlement and a fierce agitation influenced Mr. Brace's decision as his position in South Wales is very precarious. His appointment will involve a bye election in the Abertillery division of Monmouthshire. Another electoral vacancy has occurred in the Middleton division of Lancashire by the appointment of Sir Ryland Adkins as the recorder of Birmingham. Sir Ryland is a coalition liberal and had over a 6,000 majority at the last election.
