TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Chicago, Sept. 18th.—An extended daily coast mail service was begun today when planes left five cities for ports across the continent. One plane will leave each morning from New York with mail for San Francisco, one from San Francisco for New York, one from Cheyenne, Wyoming to San Francisco, one from Salt Lake City, to San Francisco, one from Chicago to San Francisco every day except Sunday, and one from Chicago to New York every day except Monday.

Hamilton, Bermuda, Sept. 13th.—The Canada West India Trade agreement which has been under consideration by the House of Assembly now in session, has been referred to a Special Commission of the House for report. The Chamber of Commerce does not favour the terms of the agreement, especially the tariff clauses, but public opinion generally is however about equally divided on the question which is now in abeyance, pending the presentation of the Committee report.

Aix Les Bains, Sept. 13th.—The joint official declaration issued this evening by Premiers Millerand and Giolitti at the conclusion of the two days meeting of the Premiers says: "The Italian and French Premiers have exchanged their views in a most confident and amicable spirit, concerning the European situation as well as the political and economic relations between France and Italy. They are happy to note the general community of interests of the two countries which can easily be reconciled. The Premiers have resolved to study in full accord a solution of the grave problem growing out of the war and up to

the present incompletely solved by peace. The essential aim remains, general pacification along equitable conditions in respect to every nation's independence and the restoration of normal economic relations free from all idea of exclusive dominations either political or economic. M. Millerand and Sigor Giolitti recognized that the fundamental basis of such peace, which in order to be lasting, must be just is a closer Entente of the Allies of the world, especially in Europe, England, Italy, and France. The restoration of political and normal order is founded upon the application equally and sincerely of the great treaties which terminated the war as well as those which remain to be concluded, in order to assure definitely European peace. The treaties are jointly binding, they must remain the cornerstone of new international relations. The victor must bring into them the spirit of kindly moderation." France and Italy reserve the right to recognize the Soviets or not, Premier Giolitti informed the Associated Press this evening, after the official communication had been given out to the press. France has already declared she does not wish to recognize the Soviet. Our freedom of action is general reserve, whether concerning political, or commercial relations. Germany shall be admitted to the League, when she shows willingness to execute the Treaty of Versailles. Whether the date be distant or not, lies entirely with Germany. The result of my meeting with M. Millerand, implies continuation of the close relations between Italy, and France which existed during the war. There is no reason why Italy, France and Great Britain, which fought side by side for years, should not be in accord when the war is concluded. On the question of Fiume, Signor Giolitti said, "it must be settled direct with Jugo-Slavia," adding: "Italy desires to come to an agreement. Italy is disposed to compromise upon a certain point, as is the custom in contracts all over the world."
