OFFICIAL NEWS.

The Congressional Committee consisting
of three senators, three representatives
and four others accompanied by Admiral
Oliver will embark on the U. S. S.
DOLPHIN at Key West, Florida, on
Friday, January 30th, and proceed to the
Virgin Islands of the United States.

Miss Elizabeth Hendrickson, delegate
of the Virgin Islands Protective League
of New York, left for St. Thomas yester-
day per schooner Virginia where she will
remain for a few days visiting St. Jan
also for the purpose of organizing
branches of the League, and starting ed-
ucational work among the Masses.

She was accompanied by the other
member of the League on visit in these
islands Miss Anne Muller, Miss Edith
Rogier and Mrs. Ester Gilbert.

The last named lady bade farewell to
Mr. Totten on the wharf, and is hasten-
ing to catch a steamer at Porto Rico for
New York where it is said she will volun-
tarily deliver a special message from the
delegates on their findings in this island,
and certain important documents for
Washington.

Miss Hendrickson will return shortly
and await instructions from the League
before deciding on her final departure.

Mr. Totten intends to repeat his lec-
ture of last Friday night, and will also
deliver one on "Manhood" to men only.
—Communicated.

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE VIRGIN
ISLANDS OF U. S. A.

According to latest reports, the pro-
posed Congressional Commission to in-
vestigate into conditions here, and who
were to have visited these islands last
Autumn, will very probably be doing so
next month.

Perhaps the inhabitants of these is-
lands will appreciate the work done for
them by their own people in America
through the Virgin Islands Protective
League, who were largely instrumental
in bringing about this visit.

prepare our people for the proper recep-
tion of these distinguished gentlemen.

The Congressional Commission for in-
vestigation into conditions in these is-
lands was introduced by Senator Keny-
on on the 8th. day of July 1919 in the
66th Congress 1st session.

It is a joint commission consisting of
three members of the Senate and three
members of the House of Representatives
appointed by the Vice President of the
United States and Speaker of the House.
