the Cabinet. The Ulster parliament will open its session on September 20th, the date being the same as that set for the Irish peace conference at Inverness.

Belfast, Sept. 12th.—A warning to the British Govt. against circumscribing the powers of the new Ulster parliament was given by Mr. Hugh Oneill, speaker of the parliament, in an address at Ballymena, county Antrim, yesterday. Any diminution of the rights or privileges of the new Ulster parliament, as a result of the projected negotiations between members of the British Cabinet and the Sinn Fein, he declared would lead to bitter civil war in Ireland. It would mean war between the north and south of Ireland, the horrors and the misery of which we do not like to contemplate and the calamity, as Mr. Lloyd George has rightly said, would not be confined to Ireland.

Bryan, Texas, Sept. 12th.—About one thousand persons have been rendered homeless through the flooding of the Brazos river, fifteen miles south of here but no reports of loss of life have been received. Thousands of bales of cotton, it is estimated have been washed away and many cattle, horses and mules lost.

London, Sept. 12th.—The value of the German mark fell today to three hundred and ninety seven and one half marks to the pound sterling. This is a new low record for the mark here.

Geneva, Sept. 12th.—The Assembly of the League of Nations today heard a great deal about the United States and the proposed Conference at Washington in November, in connection with the Leagues work, in disarmament and also with reference to criticism in the United States on the work of the League. It was a most picturesque session. Srinavasa Sastris, an Indian lawyer, wearing Indian costume, but speaking perfect english and with an eloquence rarely surpassed by English orators, had the floor at the morning session. He suggested that the United States might do something more practical than merely criticize what the League was doing, or had failed to do. He touched lightly on the race question in connection with the mandates, hinting at a difference of views on this question between India and the sister Dominion of South Africa, which is one of the mandatory powers.

Tokio, Sept. 12th.—The arrest of forty extreme Socialists, mostly Japanese, but some Koreans, was featured today by the newspapers, which allege that the arrests are connected with a serious, seditious plot. The newspapers say that officials have declared a plot to be the most important conspiracy since the anarhist movement in 1920. Inflammable literature has been seized by the police, resembling that of the communists of Russia and the Spartacists of Germany, while dynamite was seized in Tokio and a bomb depot discovered in Fukuoka,

sixty five miles north east of Nagasaki. San Juan, P. R. Sept. 14th.—The S. S. Marina arrived from San Pedro De Macoris this morning and reports that San Domingo was hard hit by the Hurricane. Twenty odd coasting craft alone went ashore at Macoris and the loss of life is placed at 22. Three small craft were caught outside and destroyed with all on board. The wind was highest on Sunday night blowing 50 miles an hour. The storm did a lot of damage at Mayaguez on Sunday night, heavy rain causing serious damage. The schooner Baker broke away and has not been heard from since. Several other boats sank.

London, Sept. 13th.—Sugar in stock on the tenth inst. was 104,000 tons. Last year 135,000 tons.

U. S. MARINES QUELL MUTINY ON SHIP

Washington, Aug. 19.—The steamship Allianca of the Panama Railway Co., is enroute to New York in charge of United States marines because of a mutiny on board.

None of the details of the mutiny is known here, it is stated, but it is believed that they are known at the company's offices in New York.

The following statement of the facts as known here was given out this afternoon by the Navy Department.

"Steamer Allianca Panama Railway Co. reported mutiny on board. Master requested guard. Two officers and twenty marines placed on board, proceeded to New York and then to join Connecticut at Annapolis."

One of the officials here said that the Annapolis station intercepted the message of the master of the ship acted at once. The message seemed to originate in latitude 20, which for a coastwise ship was sufficient accurate to locate her, as she takes the coastwise route.

It is understood that the authorities at Annapolis, under emergency orders from the Navy Department sent out the party of marines which now is in charge of the vessel at the order of the master. The fact that so many marines were sent is all muncation that the mutiny is considered a serious affair. —The Sparks Sept. 7th.
