TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Dublin, Jan. 25th.—Civilian attacks upon the police and military in various sections of the country continued on Sunday. Early today there was a simultaneous attack by 100 civilians on the police and military barracks which adjoin each other in the town of Bandon, County Cork. There was severe fighting for nearly an hour which resulted in the attacking party being beaten off. The crown forces suffered no casualties, but one civilian is known to have been killed. There was a fierce battle on Sunday when a large body of armed men attacked the Glenboater police barracks near Clonmel. The civilians were beaten off. No casualties were reported as a result of the fighting. One civilian was killed and one wounded when an attack was made upon a small body of police near Kells, County Meath. The attacking party withdrew after having captured a motor car and arms.

Paris, Jan. 25th.—Conditions in Austria which are described as "critical" were considered by the Allied Supreme Council in session today. The possibility of the utter collapse of the Austrian Government, with the attendant danger of anarchy and Bolshevism, has been before the heads of all cabinets for several weeks and the necessity for stabilizing affairs and giving Austria a chance to work out her destiny was approved when this morning's sitting began. While the representatives of Great Britain, France, Italy, Belgium and Japan examined reports on the situation centering about Vienna Allied military experts were engaged in formulating a report on the disarmament
