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by the Governor to investigate the loss of the R. M. S. "Ciraquet" consisting of W. A. Villiers Smith, President, N. H. Hutchings, Lieut-Commander Bishop, R. N. and Captain Jeffries-Davis R. N. R. Commander of the steamer Fort St. George, gave their finding. They state that Captain Hernandez was not to blame for the ship's stranding, as he had taken reasonable precaution for the safe navigation of the ship. The error in the ship's position and her stranding, were due to a strong southwesterly current experienced from noon of the 24th, to the time of her going ashore the next day. The court exonerated Captain Hernandez from all blame and his certificate was handed back to him by the President of the court.

London, Aug. 2nd.—Following is the result of the Goodwood Cup run at Goodwood today: Triumph, first; Buck Hussar second. Three horses ran.

Dublin, Aug. 1st.—A state of war does not exist in Ireland, the Court of Appeals decided today in giving its judgment in the case of Mrs. Nora Connelly O'Brien, reversing the opinion of the master of the rolls of the chancery division, who held that civil war did exist in Ireland on June 15th. Today's decision was looked forward to with great interest and its announcement caused much excitement, as it governs the position of thousands of prisoners held by the Government under the plea of military necessity the Attorney General made strenuous efforts to convince the court that the rebellion was not yet over and might break out again, but the court was emphatic in its decision that a state of war does not exist, and that the Government has no authority to deny its citizens the privileges of a writ of habeas corpus. The court made a writ of habeas corpus sought by Mrs. O'Brien's attorney, returnable tomorrow. She had been in prison for some time. Despite this decision it is regarded as unlikely that there will be any general release of prisoners as the Government, anticipating the court's decision, has passed through almost all the stages in the Dail and the Senate, a bill legally authorizing it to continue imprisonment and other repressive measures for three months. It is believed that the bill will receive the assent of the Governor General by the end of this week. The decision that the war is over affects several other legal activities of the administration, which up to this time have been pursued on the basis of military necessity. The Republicans talk of organizing a plebiscite on the bill, under a provision of the constitution.

Capetown, Aug. 1st.—Premier Smuts is ill, though his indisposition is not serious. He has been advised by his doctor to take a rest.
