ST. CROIX STATION.

Epsomdowns, Eng., June 4th—The Earl of Derby's "Sansovino," by Sywnford out of Condolette, won the Derby England's classic turf event, run here today. Viscount Astor's "St. Germaine" by Semynford, out of Hamoaze, was second, and Sonmerville Tattersall's "Hurstwood," by Gay Crusader, out of Breasdale, third. Twenty seven horses ran. The uncertainty over the possible winner was greater than ever this morning and amateur betters were warned by the sport writers not to back any horse without being prepared to lose their money. The selections of the Tipsters differed widely and all tied a string to their choices. The doubtful outcome of the race was emphasized by an overnight switch in the betting odds, the Earl of Derby's "Sansovino" becoming the favourite at 7 to 1 against H. H. Aga Khan's Diophon dropping to second place at 8 to 1, and Lord Woolavington's Tom Pinch being quoted third at 10 to 1. Kavoshima, Japan, June 3rd.—Thousands of people lined the water front of Kagoshima and stood on the hills about Kagoshima Bay to cheer the United States army round-the-world fliers upon their arrival here last evening from Kushimoto. It took six hours to cover the 425 miles. Fitful winds and rain retarded the aviators, who had been delayed at Kushimoto by bad weather. With good weather the aviators hope to continue their flight to Shanghai, 500 miles across the Yellow Sea today. Kavoshima is their last stopping place in Japan.

London, June 3rd.—Something of a sensation in racing circles and much disappointment to the general public has been caused by the decision announced today not to run King George's horse, Knight of the Garter, in the Derby tomorrow, owing to a slight lameness. Berlin, June 3rd—President Ebert has reappointed the Marx Cabinet.

St. Johns, N. F., June 3rd—The defeat of the Hickman Government in yesterday's general election in Newfoundland, was considered by the administration on the basis of returns available tonight. These indicated the election of eighteen oppositionists and two Government supporters.

London, June 3rd—The plenary session of the Anglo-Russian Conference, which had been set for tomorrow has been cancelled at the request of M. Rakovsky. No date has been set for another meeting of the two delegations, but it is believed the Russians are awaiting the arrival of Maxim Litvinoff, head of the Soviet Trade Commission abroad, who they hoped will save the conference from sleeping sickness, which it seems threatens it as a result of a six weeks negotiations which as yet have produced no tangible results.

Arnheim, London, June 2nd—In the final days play of the Davis Cup competition, India won the two matches in singles, giving that country a score of four matches to one over Holland. In the singles yesterday S. I. Jacob, India defeated H. Timmer 3-6, 8-6, 6-3, 2-6, 6-1 and M. Sleem, India, won from J. C. Van Lennep 6-3 6-3 7-5. Holland on Thursday lost both the matches in singles but on Saturday won the doubles match.
