TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

London, Feb. 8th.—Lady Bonham-Carter, who before her marriage to Sir Maurice Bonham-Carter was Miss Violet Asquith, daughter of Mr. Herbert Asquith has informed the "Evening Standard" that she has been invited to contest a certain constituency for parliament. She stated however that she had not yet decided whether or not to accept the invitation.

London, Feb. 8th.—Bolshevist troops have victoriously entered Odessa, according to a wireless message sent out today by the Soviet Govt. at Moscow.

Brindisi, Feb. 8th.—The South African airplane engaged in the competition between British aviators for the London to Cape Town flight arrived here on Friday. As the machine was about to leave for Cairo on the next stage of its journey the propeller decapitated a mechanic who was assisting to start the machine.

Cairo, Feb. 8th.—M. Clemenceau, ex-Premier of France, has arrived here.

New York, Feb. 7th.—32 passengers and 28 men of the crew of the "Princess Anne" which stranded off Rockaway Beach while bound here Norfolk, Va., were landed at the battery by the police boat patrol on Saturday afternoon. Capt. Hay of Norfolk, who was injured while navigating the boat through the storm was among those landed. The other members of the crew remained on board the ship.

negotiations, will be brought formally before the Senate tomorrow. A prompt agreement is expected on many of the points at issue, but a long and bitter contest is predicted over article ten and perhaps others provisions.

San Juan, Feb. 10th.—Shock of earthquake felt here 6.05 p. m.

Paris, Feb. 8th.—The list of those whose extradition is demanded by the Allies was issued by the foreign office last night without comment. The text of the original covering note, and of a new note referring to Baron von Lersner's refusal to accept the list, have not been

made public. A paperbound book of more than 200 pages contains the names of 296 persons, or groups, with their rank and the accusation against them. In many cases where the names are not known, a general description of the duties of the accused is given. Four pages are devoted to field marshal Hindenburg and Genl. Ludendorff, the same accusation serving for both of them. Ten commandants are asked for in the British list. The list of persons and groups who are designated by their rank or a description of their duties, because their names are not known, numbers 142.
