Lausanne, July 24th.—The Lausanne Peace Treaty, formally re-establishing peace between the European powers and Turkey, was signed today. The general treaty, formally ending the state of war, was signed by Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan, Greece, Rumania, and Turkey. Jugo-Slavia announced at the last minute her refusal to sign, on the ground that to do so would be harmful to her national interests. The treaty distributed the Ottoman debt among countries like Jugo Slavia, which has acquired part of the former Ottoman empire. Jugo Slavia maintains that she annexed her former Turkish territory, as the result of the Balkan wars and not as a consequence of the general European or Turco Greek wars. She prefers therefore to abide by the treaties of London and Bucharest which fixed the political status of the Balkans. She had agreed to negotiate directly with the European powers regarding her possible responsibility in connection with the Turkish debt. The general treaty comprises 143 articles, divided into five parts, political, financial, economic, communications and general clauses. The commercial section

stipulates the application of the Ottoman tariff inaugurated in 1916, multiplied by a coefficient corresponding to the depreciation of the Turkish currency. The great amount of work done by the Near East Peace Conference, of which the peace signed today is the outcome, is indicated by the number of documents it produced. In addition to the general treaty, there include the convention setting up the regime for the Turkish Straits to which Russia and Bulgaria adhere, and a separate agreement on the frontiers of Thrace, commercial and amnesty accords and protocols on concessions and minorities, judicial safeguards for foreigners and documents by Belgium and Portugal adhering to certain parts of the treaty. All the delegates before the meeting joined in a letter of thanks to President Scheurer for the hospitality extended them during the conference. It referred to Switzerland's traditional desire for peace and concluded, "this treaty marks the definite reestablishment of peace in the world".

Constantinople, July 24th.—Today was observed as a public holiday in honour of the signing of the peace treaty at Lausanne. Streets were gaily beflagged and shops were closed. A salute of 101 guns was fired on the announcement of the signing of the treaty and ships in the harbour blew their whistles for half an hour. Tonight there were torchlight

processions, illuminations and general rejoicings.

New York July 25th.—German marks established another new low record for all time today, one sale being made in the New York foreign exchange market at 0001½ cents or one million for \$1.50.

New York, July 25th.—A break of 140 points in July contracts was reported on the New York cotton exchange shortly after the opening this morning, July positions sold as low as 22.50 and at one time were 5 points under the October contracts, which were supported by dry weather news from the southwest. A few weeks ago July cotton was at a premium of 375 points over October.

Frankfort, July 24th.—Dr. Hass, the public prosecutor, who was killed during communist disturbances here yesterday, was literally butchered by the mob, whose leaders dragged him from his home. He was first hauled through the streets until he was unconscious. The rioters then stood him against a lamp post while he was beaten across the head and face with iron rods and clubs and pelted with stones until death came. The mob also attempted to invade the hotel Frankforterhop, but were repulsed by the police.

Berlin, July 25th.—The Berlin newspapers today report that the German police have arrested a French courier, belonging to the French embassy in Berlin in an express train near Hagen on the edge of the Ruhr. Important documents intended for the commander were seized, it is said.

Casper Wyoming, July 25th.—With unofficial estimates of the damage placed at nearly \$1,500,000 the region west and north-west of there extending as far as Thermopolis is struggling to get its head above flood waters which deluged that section yesterday. The damage to the railway between Armitage and Thermopolis, a stretch of 80 miles, is estimated at close to \$750,000. Three cloud-burst swept Casper yesterday. One about 4 in the morning, one in the afternoon and one last night. Platte river is running bank full but is not considered dangerous at present. Water is rising at Thermopolis and many buildings are flooded.

Paris, July 25th.—A French Government aeroplane yesterday successfully completed a flight from the Saint Assise wireless station to Tours and returned, a total of about 250 miles, seeing only by wireless. The indications were received on an apparatus called the radio goniometer which showed the aeroplane position with relation to the wireless station. This device enabled the pilot to make the journey with an error of only 2 percent in direction on the outward flight and with entire accuracy on the return. The test was announced as satisfactory, proving the practicability of such a method for night flying.
