TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Constantinople, Oct. 20th.—A British mission will soon proceed to Antolia for the purpose of sounding the nationalists regarding peace. The Angora Govt. has already advised the British Embassy that the delegates would be welcomed. The delegation will be composed of Major Franks and several of his staff officers. The feeling in Constantinople is that the cessation of the longdrawn out conflict in Asia Minor may possibly be in sight, especially in view of the simultaneous visit of the Greek Premier to the Allied Capital.

London, Oct. 20th.—Cambridge University today again voted against granting women membership, by a majority of 214. On December 8th last, the University refused women membership by a vote of 908 to 1,712. It was voted, however, to give women titular degrees by diploma. This recommendation was adopted by a majority of 642.

London, 20th.—The King regrets very much that owing to the great need of economy he can not afford to fit out the "Britannia" next year. This is a great disappointment to His Majesty, as there is no other sport the King enjoys more. This announcement was made at a meeting today of the Yacht Racing Association. The King has always been an enthusiastic yachtsman and this season the "Britannia" took part in several yachting regattas, winning a number of races.

New York, Oct. 21st.—The "Aquitania," with Admiral Earl Beatty on board arrived in New York harbour this morning, accompanied by destroyers and airplanes and the roar of the Fort guns.

He has come to attend the American Legion Convention in Kansas City, and later to serve in an advisory capacity to the British delegation at the armament conference in Washington.

London, Oct. 21st.—Representatives of the Dail Eireann and the British Parliament resumed at noon today their conference relative to a basis upon which might be built a lasting peace in Ireland. After a session lasting three and a half hours, the conference at 3.30 o'clock adjourned until next Monday.

Lisbon, Oct. 21st.—Senhor Craujo, Premier and Minister of the Interior, and Senhor Maia, former Minister of Marine and Colonies were assassinated during the military outbreak against the Govt. on Wednesday, which resulted in the setting up of a new administration. The newspapers here print an official note from the Junta directing the national movement which placed the new Govt. in power, vehemently against the assassination of these two public officials and other devoted republicans.

London, Oct. 21st.—The following resolution was passed unanimously at a meeting of the British Empire Producers Organization on the 19th: This organization is of the opinion that trade between the United Kingdom and the West Indies would be increased and economic ties strengthened by confirmation for a period of ten years of mutual preferences in duties.

Vienna, Oct. 22nd.—It is reported that King Alexander of Jugo-Slavia is suffering from the effects of a wound in the stomach, sustained in an attempt against his life made at Belgrade in June last, although it was declared at the time that he had escaped without injury.

Berlin, Oct. 22nd.—During a meeting of the Reichstag today, Herr Wirth the Chancellor, declared that the acceptance of the decision regarding Silesia, was threatening the defeat of the German Cabinet.

Washington, Oct. 22nd.—It has officially been announced that the withdrawal of the American troops from Germany will begin immediately upon the exchange of the treaty ratifications, which, it is expected, will be within ten days time.

Washington, Oct. 21st.—Earthquake shocks which commenced at five thirteen yesterday morning and continued until three o'clock in the afternoon, were registered at the observatory of the Georgetown University. It is calculated that the centre of the disturbance was about four thousand four hundred miles from Washington.

New York, Oct. 21st.—A general agreement appears to have been reached on the side of the railway workers on the subject of the strike. It is announced from Chicago that certain federations will vote anew at the end of the month if they desire a union of representatives

and in the event of an affirmative vote negotiations would be opened and the strike would not be declared until after their failure. The leaders of the workmen met this morning and have since declared that the date of the strike cannot be postponed but that there is good reason to hope that the situation will arrange itself. The Department of Commerce has announced that arrangements will be made, in the event of a strike, to cooperate with the Governors and Mayors to assure the transportation of food by means of boats and trucks.

Constantinople, Oct. 21st.—The assembly of Angora has approved the agreements entered into with Great Britain and France regarding the exchange of prisoners.

Lisbon, Oct. 21st.—The new Govt. has annulled the elections of the tenth July, as also all acts of the late Parliament. Perfect calm reigns throughout the country, the population having everywhere accepted the formation of the new ministry under Senhor Coelho.

Madrid, Oct. 21st.—A great patriotic demonstration took place yesterday when a battalion of the regiment of Sicilia left for the seat of war in Morocco. The King and Queen saluted the soldiers from the balcony of the palace and the Minister of War, the Captain General and Civil and Military authorities were present at the station on the departure of the troops.

Demerara, Oct. 23rd.—Sir W. Collet K. C. M. G. Governor of British Guiana returned on 22nd inst by S. S. Arakaka from England.
