TELEGRAMS

ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Jan. 5th.—The French Crown jewels which have been deposited in a Bank at Bordeaux since the end of 1914 when the German advance threatened the capital, are to be brought back here and again exhibited at the Louvre.

Washington, Jan. 5th.—Congress went to work today, upon reconvening after its fortnight holiday recess.

New York, Jan. 5th.—Attorney General Palmer has ordered a newsprint inquiry into the complaints charging the manufacturers with failure to live up to price agreements.

New York, Jan. 5th.—A radio corporation with \$2,000,000 capital, plans world-wide wireless service and will take over the Marconi Wireless Company of America. The General Electric Company is said to be interested in the new company.

Honolulu, Jan. 5th.—Heavy Japanese reinforcements have been rushed to Irukutsk to aid the forces of Admiral Kolchak there, according to cable from Tokio to the "Nippu a Jiga," a Japanese Daily newspaper here.

San Juan, P. R. Jan. 7th.—Cable between here and St. Thomas interrupted, cutting off the latter island. Telegrams will be forwarded by all opportunities from Porto Rico and St. Croix.

Constantinople, Jan. 5th.—Great importance is attached here to a movement in progress among the 20,000,000 Turks in the Caucasus, Russia and Central Asia looking to standardization of the Turkish language. Turkish, as it is spoken in Constantinople, is to be the general standard.

Buenos Aires, Jan. 5th.—An appeal for national troops has been sent by the governor of the province of Cordoba, following the burning of eight stacks of grain and threats by agitators to burn the entire harvest crop. The authorities are making numerous arrests. An appeal, also, has been made for the troops in the great lumber camps in Santa Fe Province where a strike has been in progress for twenty days and where disorder is developing. The railway strike in Northern Argentina continues.

Cairo, Dec. 31st.—The newspaper, El Whaly, asserts that at a meeting of Viscount Milner, head of the Conciliation Committee, was Roughdi Pasha, Ahmed Mazloun Pasha, and Yeghen Sara Pasha. It was decided to sink all differences and to work together "to safeguard the country's rights. The newspaper "Wali El Niel", publishes an interview with form-
