ST. CROIX STATION.

Paris, Nov. 30th.—The Bill for the re-establishment of the Embassy to the Vatican was adopted by the Chamber today by 397 to 309.

Washington, November 30th.—President Wilson has accepted the invitation of the League of Nations to act as mediator in the Armenian situation. Mr. Wilson's acceptance is conditional upon the use of moral influence. He explains that he is without authority to employ force without the consent of Congress. The invitation to mediate between the factions in Armenia was extended to Mr. Wilson last week through M. Paul Hymans, President of the League Assembly. Mr. Wilson already has consented to fix the boundary lines of Armenia, and he now has before him special reports on the subjects. There has been no indication, however, when he will complete this work.

New York, Nov. 30th.—Raw sugar was somewhat unsteady early today, but prices were unchanged. There were sales of 4,000 bags of Porto Rico's, about due to a local refiner @ 5.56 delivered. The unsettled feeling in the spot market led to further selling in sugar futures and prices at midday were about 5 to 12 points lower.
