TELEGRAMS.

ST. CROIX STATION.

Dusseldorf, May 15th.—Four dye and chemical plants, one of them the largest in the world, were taken over by the French and Belgium troops of occupation today. The largest plant is the Baden Aniline plant, near Ludwigshafen, employing 40,000 workers. Two other plants, the Meister Lucius and Brienning works at Hoechst, near Frankfort, and

the Kalle-Bienbrich works, near Wiesbaden, were occupied by the French, while the Belgians took charge of a large plant near Crefeld. These works are part of the dye trust which, during the war, manufactured high explosives and poison gas. It was explained at French headquarters that they were occupied because the owners, under the provisions of the treaty of Versailles, had undertaken to make deliveries of chemicals and dyes to the Allies which they had failed to make since the Ruhr occupation.

Berlin, May 15th.—The reply of the Japanese Government to the recent German reparations offer was delivered to the German Foreign Office today. It declares that "both on account of the total figure mentioned, as well as the method of payments thereof and guarantees, the Japanese Government finds it is impossible to give its adhesion to the German reparations project". The note adds that inasmuch as her interests are not as great or as vital as those of the other Allied powers, Japan will refrain from expressing an opinion on the details of the proposals, but is hopeful that the German Government will do everything necessary to facilitate a prompt and friendly settlement of the problem as a whole.

Lahore, British India, May 15th.—The Amritsar National Bank, a native institution, has suspended payment. The suspension was brought about owing to a continuous run on the bank and the uncertainty due to the suspension of the Simla Alliance Bank.

New York, May 15th.—Customs authorities today were advised that the British yacht *Thelma-Phoebe*, alleged to have been laden with nearly \$320,000 worth of liquor, had sunk shortly after putting out from the Bahamas. The entire cargo was lost and one or two of the crew drowned, the report said.

London, May 15th.—The British Davis cup team which will face the Belgians in the first round will be composed of Bryan Gilbert, L. A. Godfrey, Randolph Lycett, and T. M. Mavrogordots, it was announced today. The team was selected after a series of trial matches at Scarborough.

London, May 15th.—Three hundred members of the House of Commons, representative of all political factions, joined in a great tribute to Mr. T. P. O'Connor "Father" of the House on the occasion of his seventy-fifth birthday anniversary. Mr. Stanley Baldwin was the toastmaster and the speakers included the Ex-Premiers Messrs Lloyd George and Asquith and Mr. J. Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the Parliamentary Labour Party. "Tay Pay" was presented with a gold snuff box filled with snuff, which the toastmaster said he hoped he would accept as a "lasting memorial" of the affection and esteem in which he was held by his colleagues.
