our countrymen will support the Empire, as will the opinion of the civilized world". The Colonial Secretary said the Northern Govt. offer was generous, sincere and unanimous, and could be carried into effect immediately. Allegiance to the King whether as King of Great Britain or of Ireland, must however, be insisted upon. "Now could we agree to the setting up of a separate foreign Republic in Ireland?" he asked, not peace, he said, but a real war, not mere bush ranging, would follow such a course. "We want a conference, but a successful one", he declared. Ulster, he said, had made a sacrifice, and no longer a stumbling block to the rest of Ireland. He cannot see much real foundation for the optimism which prevailed, and he still was uncertain where the Irish leaders stood. The proposed conference, he declared, was the only thing which stood between the Govt. and failure. The Secretary, however, through his declaration that there would be insistence upon allegiance to the King, whether as "King of Great Britain or of Ireland", was considered by many of his hearers to have virtually held out the prospect to Ireland of a separate Kingdom along the lines suggested by Lord Hugh Cecil last May, when he brought forward a scheme by which Ireland would be made an independent Kingdom, the King to be a member of the Windsor family, probably the Prince of Wales, to be appointed by the King.

Paris, Sept. 26th.—An attempt was made to assassinate General Pilsudski, President of the Polish Republic, at Lemberg, Galicia, last night, says a despatch received here. Three revolver shots were fired at him, but the bullets went wide. The would-be assassin was arrested.

London, Sept. 26th.—Yutoi, six to one, won the Newbury Cup race for two years old on Saturday. Flint Jack, four to one, and Bucks 85 to 4 dead

heated for second place. Yutoi won by a length, and was ridden by Richards. Twelve horses ran.

Geneva, Sept. 26th.—Methods of applying the economic weapon of the League of Nations against a country which violates the provisions of the Covenant of the League, came before the Assembly of the League this morning, when the blockade committee submitted its report. The committee found it was impossible for the League to decide before hand in detail the various steps of an economic, commercial and financial nature that should be taken in each case. It proposed that the Council of the League make recommendations to the members for a plan for joint action, when necessity should arise. Interruption of diplomatic relations would be first limited to the withdrawal of the heads of diplomatic missions. The committee held, however, that while consular relations might be maintained, if prolonged application of economic pressure was necessary, it should be progressively made more stringent. In the resolutions that were proposed, provision was made that certain states might for a certain period be released from the obligation of blockading another country, if the conditions were such as would involve special danger to these states. An important question facing the Assembly at the beginning of this debate was how to meet action on the propositions of the committee under the rule requiring unanimity, this rule not yet having been abrogated. Lord Robert Cecil, representing the Union of South Africa, recently made a motion that the rule be suspended, but it was referred to the constitutional committee. An effort will be made to obtain a vote on this motion before balloting begins on the resolutions regarding the blockade. It is believed here that unanimity on committee recommendations is impossible.

Halifax, Sept. 26th.—The tender called by the Department of Trade and Commerce for a steamship service between Canada and the British West Indies and British Guiana, which will be received up to noon January 31st 1923, called for two forms of service, one weekly or fortnightly from St. John or Halifax and the other weekly or fortnightly from St. John and Halifax alternately. The alternate form of sailings from the two ports was recommended to the Department by the St. John board of trade. The service is designed to cover a period of five or ten years. Tenders are requested to state the earliest date on which they can establish the service proposed. The steamers to be employed are to be from 5,000 to 6,000 gross capable of maintaining an ocean speed of twelve knots and providing accommodation for one hundred first class, 30 second class and 100 steerage or deck passengers, and shall be provided with tweendecks. The contract will provide that there shall be reasonable proportionate allocation of passenger and cargo accommodation between the Colonies mentioned. There shall be no unfair differentiation in rates of freight against the smaller colonies as compared with the rates of large colonies, situated at a similar distance from St. John or Halifax. Freight and passenger rates will at all times be subject to the approval of the Minister of Trade and Commerce. The steamers are to be constructed, that, so far as the traffic warrants, cold storage shall be provided, but alternative tenders may be submitted offering the steamers with, or without cold storage. Provision will also be made for the carrying of mails. The contract provides that on the outward sailings, the steamers shall call one week at Bermuda, Barbados, Trinidad and British Guiana and on the homeward passage at Trinidad, Grenada, St. Vincent, Barbados, St. Lucia, Montserrat, Antigua, Nevis, St. Kitts, and Bermuda and on the alternative week calling on the outward passage at Bermuda, St. Kitts, Nevis, Antigua, Montserrat, and Dominica, St. Lucia, Barbados, St. Vincent, Grenada, Trinidad, and British Guiana, and on the homeward, passage at Trinidad, Barbados, and Bermuda.

London, Sept. 26th.—The Inter-Allied control mission has sent a sharp note to the German Govt. protesting against the continued military formation of the police force.

London, Sept. 26th.—Mr. Lloyd George will send the Govt's. answer to the latest note from Mr. De Valere on Wednesday, it was learned here today.

Belfast, Sept. 26th. Sir Jas Craig, the Ulster Premier, after a conference here with the military and police this morning, announced that it had been decided to mobilize special constables in certain parts of North Ireland for the maintenance of order.
