

Head in South-western Russia, has been received by the War Office. Genl. Denekine's troops took the town after two days of heavy fighting.

Montreal, Sept. 5th.—By touching a button at Balmora Castle is electrically connected by cable with Montreal, King George tomorrow afternoon will unveil the statue of Sir George Etienne Cartier on Fletchers Field. As the curtain around the statue falls, a band will play "CANADA" "MONS PAYS" "MES AMOURS" which were composed by the Canadian statesman who was born 100 years ago. Today the ceremony will be witnessed by the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire and a distinguished company.

Paris, Sept. 5th.—Georges Gaston Quein, charged with having had treasonable dealing with the Germans and having betrayed Edith Cavell to them, today was convicted and condemned to death.

Brussels, Sept. 5th.—The Belgian Government, according to "Le Soir" has sent a note to Holland threatening to place an embargo on Dutch shipping unless Holland return a German ship which left Belgium after the armistice was signed. The vessel was discovered later in the Rhine, and reported to its German owners by the Dutch.

London, Sept. 5th.—The Evening Standard says it learns on the highest authority that Belgium's security in the future is to be guaranteed against German aggression by Great Britain and the United States.

London, Sept. 5th.—Discussing Lord Fisher's letter, the Times thinks it shows beyond doubt that what he advocates is constructive economy, which consigns obsolete instruments to the scrap heap and replaces them with efficient modern weapons. Neither this country nor the Empire can afford to allow the sea problems to be lost sight of. The Dominions have won their place in the world, they can hold it only if they recognize as Great Britain has already recognized that their life is the sea and it is for us to understand their difficulties which are ours too and share in their solution. For this reason the Times applauds Admiral Jellicoe's Mission and repeats its call for Admiral Beatty as First Sea Lord.

Ottawa, Sept. 5th.—The Department of Agriculture has received a cable from the British Ministry of Food as follows: The Food Controller has definitely decided not to purchase the balance of this season's exportable surplus of Canadian cheese after twenty thousand tons have been secured.

Paris, Sept. 5th.—The Peace Treaty with Bulgaria was completed by the Allied Delegates this afternoon. It will be presented to the Bulgarians on Monday.

Berlin, Sept. 5th.—The German reply to the note of the Allies with regard to the representation of Austria in the Ger-

man Reichstag, says the German Peace Delegation informed the Allies on May 27th, that Germany had no intention of modifying the Austro-German boundaries by violence but could not undertake to oppose German Austria's spontaneous desire for union with Germany.

Washington, Sept. 5th.—The prohibition enforcement bill was passed by the Senate today with a record vote and virtually in the form it came from the committee. The measure now goes to conference for discussion of amendment inserted in the House Bill by the Senate. The only material change made in the Bill in the Senate was the addition by amendment of the liquor and drug prohibition act for the Panama Canal Zone. The measure has not yet been acted on by the House. An eleventh hour attempt by Senator Shields (Democrat), Tennessee, to render ineffective the whole section of the measure relating to the enforcement of war time prohibition, failed, his own vote being the only one cast in favour of it. His amendment would have limited the operation of the wartime like to the six States in which demobilization camps are located. As it passed the Senate and goes to conference, the bill defines as an intoxicant any beverage containing more than half of one per cent of alcohol. The Senate modified however some of the most rigid provision of the House Bill, including that affecting private stock of alcohol beverage held for personal use.
