NEW COUNTERFEIT \$10 FEDERAL RESERVE NOTE.

The Treasury Department furnishes the following description of a new counterfeit \$10 Federal reserve note:

"On the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta, Ga.; check letter 'A'; face plate No. 83; W. G. Mc Adoo, Secretary of the Treasury; John Burke, Treasurer of the United States, portrait of Jackson.

"This is a photographic production on two pieces of paper between which red and blue silk threads have been distributed. The back of the bill is a vanadium print. The seal and the numbers on the face of the bill have had blue coloring applied to them. The stiffness of the paper and the glazed appearance of the printing should attract attention immediately.

"The circulation of this counterfeit has been confined to less than a half dozen notes in the southern section of the country.—The Postal Bulletin, March 15, 1923.

St. Thomas News

The Secretary of the Navy and Party in St. Thomas.

Sunday morning, shortly after 7. A. M. the U. S. S. "Henderson" entered port, bearing the distinguished guests whose visit had been previously announced and was anxiously awaited.

His Excellency, the Governor called on the Secretary after colors had been hoisted, returning from the ship 9.45.

At 10 o'clock, the Hon. Edwin Denby, accompanied by his military aides and Admirals Coontz, Reynolds and Pratt landed on the Kings Wharf, where they were received by the Governor and all the naval officers on duty here. A detachment of marines formed a guard of honor, and the naval band was also in attendance. The salute, appropriate to his rank was fired by the battery. After a profuse shaking of hands, the Secretary entered the Governor's automobile, and together with the Governor was taken to the Executive mansion.

At 2. P. M. the Hon. Secretary and Congressional Party met the Councils of St. Croix, St. Thomas & St. John in joint session. Many of the newspapermen who are accompanying the party were present.

The meeting was called to order by the Governor, who stated its object, and requested the Chairman of the St. Thomas-St. John Council to call the roll and request the members to rise on hearing their names, so that they could be identified by the visitors. A similar request was made to Chairman Merwin, of the St. Croix Council, and in both cases acceded to. This formality being over, Chairman Thiele, of St. Thomas & St. John delivered a short address of welcome, and it having been previously agreed by the members of St. Thomas that their colleagues across the channel should take precedence, as an act of courtesy, the Chairman of the St. Croix Council introduced his report with some appropriate remarks and requested his secretary to read the document. This gave rise to many questions being asked, especially on the subject of Water, one of the principal features of the mentioned report these questions were however satisfactorily answered and explained by the Chairman and Member Andersen principally.

On St. Croix resting her case temporarily, the Chairman of the St. Thomas St. John conceded the word to Mr. C. Corneiro, who there and then appeared as a representative of the St. Thomas Harbor Board, and read the Memorandum which that institution had prepared for presentation to the Hon. Secretary and Party. The Harbor Board's representative also formally expressed to the Hon. Secretary the fullest appreciation by the native members of the valuable services render-
